1. Vaka Consultation on Climate Change

The Climate Change Cook Islands Division (CCCI) of the Office of the Prime Minister, in collaboration with the Development Coordination Division (DCD) of the Ministry of Finance and Economic Management, was happy to contribute to the different community groups on the island during its Green Climate Fund (GCF) Vaka Consultations. Over the month of August, consultations were conducted with the Northern Group participants in the heart of their islands hostels (Pukapuka, Manihiki, Rakahanga and Penhryn) during the Maeva Nui celebrations. Vaka Consultations on Rarotonga also continued in the villages of Avarua, Matavera, Titikaveka, Rutaki, Muri Enua and Nikao.

These consultations covered the development of both a National Climate Change Policy and the Cook Islands Country Programme under the GCF, ensuring the community and key stakeholders were engaged in order to identify practical priorities that could potentially be supported by the GCF. CCCI, under the funding agency of the GCF has conducted consultations with over 500 community and key stakeholders since 2016. The team will continue with the series of GCF consultations to further engage with the community, stakeholders and Pa Enua.


of us. Opetipa Rua was our main arena for all our day and evening program.

The day continued with separate meetings by each of the 5 Fellowships.

The first day of the conference ended with the Pacific Fellowship country report which was presented by the President Mrs Renelle Neale of Australia. This was then followed by performances by the Australia, New Zealand and Cook Islands/Niue/Papua New Guinea delegates. Young Leaders Matangaro and Evelyn did us proud with their performance.

WORKSHOPS AND KEY NOTE SPEECHES

The following were the workshops topics and key-note speeches presented during the week and the delegates had the opportunity to choose which workshop they wanted to attend. We decided to take different workshops to try and attend all the workshops that were available as these were very inspiring topics presented by very inspirational speakers.

1. **Pruning for Growth – Vivienne Aitchison – GB International President 2014-2018**Like many organisations, GB has developed ways of working, models of mission and set protocols. Over the years, many of these things are deemed to be 'the way GB does it'. This workshop was intended to help us look at those things which are important and needful and should be preserved, whilst identifying those things which are, hindering our growth and development. Participants explored not just what needs to change but how to make that change happen; identify the barriers and look at



strategies to help us prune and so maintain our fruitfulness whilst working in the world of the 21st century and beyond.

2. Leading like Jesus - Ms Hee Piang Chin

Who has been your leadership model? Why Jesus should be your leadership role model and how we can grow our personal capacity to Lead Like Jesus. Participants explored how different Jesus' perspective of leadership is from the worlds; examined our own beliefs about leadership and elicit what stands in our way to lead like Jesus. An interactive session where participants spent time listening, considering, reflecting, sharing, discussing and committing to Lead Like Jesus.

3. **Bear MORE Fruit – Rev. Dennis Pethers, a former Chaplain for Girls' Brigade England and** Wales and he is still a regular speaker at their conferences where he continues to help fulfil their calling. Now as founder and international Pioneer fo The Rooftop, he travels the world seeking to help churches to grasp a vision of God's heart for the lost – a vision that is at the heart of The Rooftop' and at the heart of GB too!

Rev. Dennis Pethers encouraged the delegates by helping them see the important part they play in producing 'fruit'. GB leaders are fruit bearers but don't always realise the way they bless others on a weekly basis. Leaders have to work in many different cultures and contexts and this can impact the way they approach their fruit bearing. However, if our leaders establish a Biblical foundation for their fruit bearing, they will be effective in their ministry.

4. Social Enterprise – Leonida Odongo

GB works in many diverse settings and contexts. In some areas of our GB world social engagement is used in a variety of ways to reach out. Some areas have not, to date, seen this as a potential way of working. This workshop gave some basic guidelines for developing this kind of work, It looked at potential barriers and pitfalls alongside benefits and top-tips to help improve understanding of the topic. It is hoped that participants will see how some of the ideas might be adopted in their company/country.

5. Advocacy – How can GB raise hope for girls? – Dr Claire Rush – President of GB Europe Fellowship – this interactive workshop helped participants develop an understanding of advocacy and explore unique challenges that girls around the world are facing. Participants also got a sneak peek of a new and free GBI resource which will help them to turn up the volume of Gospel hope for girls in their local community

6. Spiritual Care - Pastor Brenda Munemba-Sichilembe

Issues such as burn out and stress can be major issues in Christian service today. The aim of the workshop was to give participants some input relating to how they can keep themselves spiritually healthy. As busy leaders we need to learn how to prioritise our own well-being, learn resilience and develop spiritual maturity. Those who take good care of their own spiritual well-being will be better equipped to keep serving.

7. Understanding the soil – Mrs Janett Mwafulilwa Kalale

Luke 14: 28-30 "Suppose one of you wants to build a tower. Won't you first sit down and estimate the cost to see if you have enough money to complete it? For if you lay the foundation and are not able to finish it, everyone who sees it will ridicule you, saying, 'This person began to build and wasn't able to finish.' Four soils, four hearts

Ideas Worth Sharing

The following are the ideas shared during this session by some of the countries:



- ✓ **GB Nigeria, Social Action to Alleviate Poverty** with goals 'to alleviate poverty among orphans, widows and needy', and, 'to show them love and have open doors for evangelism'. This was a very interesting topic and part of the GB members' activity in Nigeria is to visit the orphanage homes, widows, prisons and the needy and share clothing, food items, medicines, educational materias, tuition fees, and in some cases sewing machines and knitting machines. Key barriers were finances and getting support from the church leaders. They partnered with Partons, churches and healthcare professionals some of the key outcomes/impacts were many have heard salvation messages and accepted Christ, they feel loved and accepted, they have acquired skills and are self-reliant
- ✓ **GB Friendship Day (Singapore)** used the word 'LENS' (Lonely, Elderly, Needy and Special Needs as the focus for this friendship day. Healthy living, Spiritual, Physical, Educational and Service activities were held with those "LENS" who were part of the gathering.
- ✓ GB Jamaica Mini Pantomime Production with the goal to highlight issues faced by youths in Jamaica, to sensitize the girls and community to these and to present various options for dealing with these. Some of the scenes depicted violence against children, parental abuse, child neglect, sexual abuse and human trafficking and included the composition of some original songs relevant to the theme. The project was led by the GB in partnership with the BB, church, parents and past brigadiers. The outcomes realized from this production were skills in drama, interpersonal skills, evidence of behaviour change, girls became more confident and there was a cohesiveness within the group. Representatives from the Child Protection and Family Service Agency and community group that dealt with youth at risk were impacted positively and benefited from alternative ways of responding to these type of issues being faced.

BUSINESS MEETINGS

A week before the ICGB, the International President's Committee, (International President and the Presidents for each of the five Fellowships) held their annual meeting. The outcome of this meeting was then presented in the business meeting including financial updates. The main agenda for the business meeting was the confirmation of the election of the new International Treasurer and the new International President for 2018-2022. Mrs Priscilla Penny of GB Zimbabwe was the only nomination for and this was unanimously supported by all GB countries.

FELLOWSHIP MEETINGS, REPORTS, SPORTLIGHTS AND PRESENTATION

Each Fellowship took this opportunity to hold meetings to discuss relevant issues and updates. Some of the key areas discussed during Fellowship meetings were: **Resourcing our Work, Intergenerational Leadership - Hearing the Voice of our Younger Members and Raising Hope for Girls – Advocacy.**These topics raised very good discussions. Each Fellowships also hosted each day of the conference starting with opening devotions and updates from countries within the Fellowship and in the evenings presentation on Spotlights and cultural presentations or performances.

OUT AND ABOUT DAY

Today the delegates were divided into different teams and visited the following:

Childrens' hospital – Rachael and Mareta decided to be part of this team and it was an eye opening
for them especially for Mareta as she is a NZ registered nurse. The delegates took donations of
clothing, blankets, books and etc to the hospital







2. **Planting trees at one of the Zambia hospitals** – the rest of us joined this team and it was a privilege to be part of this tree planting activity. The plants were donated by the ICGB.



- 3. **The Livingstone Museum** very interesting to read the history of Livingstone, Zambia's city where the ICGB was held. Dr David Livingstone was the first European to visit this town hence the reason for naming it after him. Due to his love of the people and the land, before he died he asked for his heart to be buried in Zambia, his body was then returned to England. He was also the first European to discover and publicise the mighty Victoria Falls
- 4. **The Victoria Falls** It was an amazing and awesome feeling to witness and feel one of God's mighty creations, one of the "Seven Natural Wonders of the World". There was a lot of energy and thunder coming from the water fall and couldn't believe that we would get wet from the water sprays as the water hits the bottom of the fall, at time it felt like it was raining.

SAFARI TOURS AND SIGHTSEEING

We decided to spend 2 extra days in Zambia after the conference to do Safari tours and sightseeing, it certainly was worth doing this and we highly recommend this to anyone who happen to be in this part of the world. It was an awesome feeling to see and be close to some of Africa's wild animals. The elephants are huge and scary.

We also went to see the white rhinos. We had to go in small teams and each time took turns going to see the rhinos, we had to walk in a single line and had guards carrying guns infront and behind us. The rhinos were sleeping when we got there so we had to watch them from a distance. We also saw and came close to zebras, giraffes, crocodiles, wild hogs and other smaller animals and cats, no snakes though...thank goodness!!

We also took a sunset cruise on the Zambesi river – we saw more elephants, hippos, crocodiles. What was most amazing was to see a full grown wild elephant swim from one side of the river (Zimbabwe) to the other side (Zambia), a very rare sight. Just watching this huge animal totally submerged in the water except for the trunk that keeps coming up to breath. We were told that we were lucky because it is very rare for these cruises to come across an elephant swim across the river, Praise the Lord. There were about 5 ferries on the river and they all stopped to witness this rare sight and to allow the elephant swim across safely. What was also very interesting was when it got on the other side of the river there was a steep bank and we were all amazed as to how the elephant climbed the bank because we all wondered what it was going to do, it actually climbed up the same way a human would climb up!!!

We sailed to where this huge river splits into 3 rivers and went as close as we can to the Victoria Falls, about 2 kilometres from the fall, we crossed into Zimbabwe and fortunately we were on the river so was not required to take our passports or visa but we can say we were in Zimbabwe. To get into Zimbabwe on land you have to go through border checks and need your passport and visa as this is a different country.



8. SINGING THE LORD'S SONG AT PCC ASSEMBLY IN AUCKLAND



inging the Lord's Songs in a foreign land" (Psalms 137: 4) sets the theme for the 11th General Assembly of the Pacific Council of

Churches, which was held in Mangere, Auckland, New Zealand from the 27th October to the 1st of November 2018. Around 30 member churches from around the Pacific gathered together at the Free Wesleyan Church of Tonga in Mangere to address business matters of the churches as well as social issues affecting out Pacific Island people.



A youth pre-assembly was held on Saturday

27th of October, with around 30 youth members and youth leaders participated in the youth pre-assembly, due to visa problems some were not able to attend the assembly. We started our youth pre-assembly with a reflection, reflecting on the theme for the 11th General Assembly, "Singing the Lords Song in a foreign land". What song are you singing in a foreign/strange/new land? Are you singing an old song in a new land? The songs represent messages of hope, of thanks giving and so forth. We then went into groups and discuss about social issues affecting our youth, our country and our regions. We shared and listened to other youths talking about the effect of technologies on youth today, climate change, drug abuse, domestic violence, unemployment, relationship gap within families and many other issues. From all that was shared we put them together in a resolution to be presented to the members of the assembly during the youth report presentation. Some of the resolutions are:



- 1. We call on the leaders to affirm the voice of our young people at all level of decision making from churches to national level, to regional and also at global level.
- 2. We call on the secretariat with the support of partners and donors to develop policies and programme for member churches truly addressing the issues of youths and violence, suicide, youth and substance abuse and so forth.
- We affirm our voice on the need for the PCC executive and other executive forum, together with the secretariat in making sure that the youth program continues to exist and flourish into the next 5 years of our journey.
- 4. Our humble and sincere ask to our church leaders in allowing the secretariat to look seriously on the issues of youth suicide, noting the rise of reported cases amongst youth across our island states.

These are just 4 of 11 resolutions that were presented to the assembly by the youth members. In this youth gathering Shane Ashlee Ailu from the Catholic Bishop Conference of Papua New Guinea was nominated as our youth representative to the PCC executives.

There are three main parts to the assembly, the bible study and devotion, group discernments and plenary. The assembly proper covers various businesses of the churches. Here we hear and receive the Moderator and the General Secretary's report, financial and property reports, program reports, Women and Youth Reports. Discussions and concerns are exchanged within the assembly on amended constitutions, issues that member churches are facing in their countries, updates on proposals and also electing of the new Moderator, vice Moderator, General Secretary and PCC executives for the next 5 years. We witness church leaders stand together to end modern day slavery by signing the Joint Declaration of Religious Leaders Against Modern Slavery.

Throughout the week of the assembly, the members were hosted by various Pacific Island Churches in New Zealand. The reception from morning tea right through to dinner was very over whelming. Our Pacifica people went out and beyond to make sure that all members were well fed and entertained. I am sincerely proud of our Cook Islands Christian Church in New Zealand for the wonderful and over whelming meals they had prepared during the CICC host, the heartfelt turou and pulsating entertainment, I am without a doubt that papa President and our General Secretary was overwhelmed by what you have put together.

My highlight for the assembly will definitely be the Bible studies and group discernments. The Bible studies and group discernments were based on the theme, "Singing the Lords song in a foreign land". I believe it is very fitting theme for us Pacifica people as we are a migrating people. Leaving the comfort of our home, our tradition, our culture and our value and moving to a foreign land, to a new land in a hope for a better life.

Some of the things I have captured from our group discernments;

- No matter where we go, never stop singing the Lords songs. These songs are prayer, hope, faith and love
- We need to renew our song, (our message) to be able to address current issues that our youth are facing today.
- Don't let our songs be documents.
- We all need to sing one song with the right tune, tempo and in harmony (working together).

As the assembly comes to an end, new friends have been made new ideas fonder and new experience have been achieved and I am grateful for this opportunity. I would also like to acknowledge the General Secretary and the CICC executives for allowing me to be part of this 11th General Assembly. To my family and friends thank you atupaka for your continuous support and prayers.

"We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realizing this. This enables us to do something, and to do it very well. It may be incomplete, but it is a beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest. We may never see the end results, but that is the difference between



the master builder and the worker. We are workers, not master builders, ministers, not messiahs. We are prophets of a future not our own".

Noatu ra te reira, tei roto rai tatou i te PCC e te vai ra te au puapinga e rauka maina i roto i teia pirianga. E raveia ana te uipaanga maata a te PCC i te au 5 mataiti katoatoa, e na tatou na Rarotonga i utuutu/host i te mataiti 2002 ki te National Auditorium.

PUAPINGA O TE TEREANGA

I te mea e na te pute maata a te CICC te akapouanga no teia tereanga no maua ki Nutireni, ka tau rai ireira kia ui'ia te uianga e, me kua puapingaia te tereanga? Irinaki maua e ae, kua puapingaia no teia au tumuanga i raro nei:

Uipaanga a te PCC

- a) Ei akatupu uatu rai i ta to tatou au metua Evangelia i akatinamou i te au mataiti i topa e kia angaanga kapiti tatou ki to tatou au taeake i roto i te akarongo mei te Pasifika mai i te akatupuanga i to te Atua anoano ki roto i te ngakau tangata. Continuing the legacy of our Christian forebearers in having us part of the formation of PCC and working together with our brothers and sisters in the Pacific in the building of his kingdom in the hearts and minds of both memembers and non-members.
- b) I te mea e ko tatou CICC tetai i akatupuia'i te PCC, e mea tau rai ireira e kia tae tatou ki te au akakoronga mei teia te tu kia rongoia mai i to tatou reo. We must be present in person in order for our voices to be heard. And being on the executive committee again is an opportunity to strengthen the voices of the medium churches including the CICC.
- c) Te tikaanga tei rauka i te President i te atoro atu ia ratou i roto i nga Ekalesia ma te iti o te akapouanga. A sideline benefit of the President being able to visit those branches mentioned above to go through issues and matters of interest at no additional cost.
- d) Na roto i te au apainga tei apaiia e ta tatou au Ekalesia i Nutireni (nga angaianga i te Ruirua, e pera te utuutuanga i te au mata no Tahiti mai vaitata ki te 2 epetoma), kua kiteia mai tatou te CICC i mua i te mata tangata e ratou katoatoa mei te Pasifika mai. The efforts of our church branches in NZ in catering for the assembly lunch and dinner on Tuesday, as well as hosting the Tahitian delegation to the assembly, have been well received and recognized at this regional ecumenical church level.
- e) Topiri atu ki te (d) i runga nei, kua riro ta ratou i rave ei akamatutu atu i to ratou inangaro i te utuutu i ta tatou ta te CICC uipaanga maata i te mataiti 2023 ki Akarana. Ko te manakonako e te inangaro ia



o te Konitara Ekalesia Nutireni, ka tapapa atu ra i nga mataiti e tu mai nei. *The inputs of our branches in NZ have to some extent strengthened their resolve to host our CICC assembly in 2023. That is their intention and desire, and they have 5 years to make it happen.*

- f) Kua riro to maua taeanga ki te uipaanga a te PCC ei ravenga no te atoro katoa atu anga ia ratou i te South Island ma te kore e akapouanga mei roto mai i to ratou pute. *Our participation in the assembly was a golden opportunity to also visit them in the south at no additional cost to them.*
- g) Na roto i te iriiri kapua e te au komakomaanga kia ratou tei tae mai, kua rauka tetai au ngai tai'i i te akatanotano iatu, noatu e kare i rava te tuatau i te nooanga ki rotopu ia ratou. Through the workshop and informal discussions with them who were able to make it to Ashburton, certain problem areas were able to be sorted, despite the shortage of time. Some outstanding issues, however, must remain on the agenda for future deliberations.

12. ABOUT IMR @ PTC

his is an introductory piece about the Institute for Mission and Research (IMR). IMR is jointly owned by the Pacific Conference of Churches (PCC) and the Pacific Theological College (PTC). It is the amalgamation of two programmes, one owned by PCC which is the God's Pacific People (GPP) programme started in 1999 after a PCC resolution at the PCC assembly in Maohi Nui in 1997 and reaffirmed by the Cook Islands General Assembly of PCC in 2002 which deals with

capacity building for mission and the other by PTC Council in 1998 which is the Institute for Research and Social Analysis (IRSA) programme on research and training on social analysis.

IMR was launched in January 2017 at PTC to serve the mission (capacity building) and the research needs of both PCC and PTC member churches. The current capacity building for mission activities offered by IMR are the following certificate courses delivered with the churches in-country: peace-building; pastoral counselling; social analysis; and leadership and management. Over the past two and a half years, these certificate courses have been in demand, especially among the Churches in the Melanesia countries. The demand for these courses is based on their uniqueness. It combines both theological and biblical learning, as well as secular learning insights into the areas of learning. It is also practical because the courses are conducted as workshops with practical applications. Said one school principal from Vanuatu in the leadership and management certificate training in May 2018: "... after the training I saw improvement in my leadership."

The point is that the capacity building mission programme is making a difference in the lives of those who participated and graduated, not only in their school environment but also with their families and the communities they live: "What I learnt never leaves me. LM is in every area of life- in the home, at work, [in] community responsibility. The course equips us to be able to lead an organisation", said one school teacher in Vanuatu, who was also the president of her netball association.

On research, IMR launched the book 'Navigating Troubled Waters – Ecumenism in the Pacific since the 1980s'. The publication was the culmination of four years of work. It was mandated by both PCC (2013) and PTC (2012). The book has been adopted by the recent PCC General Assembly in Auckland for study and discussion by the churches that participated in the research.

13. REPORTS ON VISITATIONS BY THE PRINCIPAL



he Takamoa Theological College Principal, Rev. Tere Marsters, recently represented the CICC at meetings around the Pacific. He writes about those meetings below.

1. PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH AOTEAROA NEW ZEALAND ASSEMBLY 2018 (3-7 October)

1st October, departed Takamoa to Auckland and caught connecting flight to Christchurch. Arrived in Christchurch late that evening and was picked up by the Session Clerk and taken to the Motel.

St Andrews College in Christchurch was the host venue and the 1st session commenced on Wednesday the 3rd October. The Assembly began with an Installation Service of the new Moderator the Rev Taimoanaifakaofo Kaio in the main auditorium where the conference was held. This was carried out by the current Moderator the Rev Richard Dawson and three previous Moderators. The music was both traditional and a band lead contemporary music.

The New Moderator the Rev Taimoanaifakaofo Kaio spoke on the subject "JESUS IS THE HEART OF RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD AND PEOPLE". Rev Kaio mentioned the Call of Abraham, the great commission and the need to taking up the cross, denying ourselves and following Christ daily. He then urged everyone to work together and work with others in relationship. He also encouraged the assembly to display clearly our relationship with God and our relationship with other people.

The GA 2018, as it was called, was attended by more the 300 people. These were Ministers, commissioners, representatives, department leaders and members of the Presbyterian Church. There were three International Guests, Mr Rob Floyd of the Australian Uniting Church, Rev Nukanuka from Nuie and myself. Each of us was given 10 minutes to address the Assembly. I spent some time talking with Rev Robert Mani and Rev Tokerau Joseph about the need for us to work together. Rev Mani was very helpful to me during the Assembly.

Saturday was an informal night whereby the Catholic Bishop, Women Pastor of the New Life Church and one young pacific islands minister from the Presbyterian church, ministered openly and they all answered questions. The Assembly had, on Wednesday and Thursday, business sessions in the morning and other matters. In the afternoon the Assembly broke up into discussion groups which were dealing with current issues and matters for the Assembly to consider. These groups would then bring everything back to present to the Assembly for discussion and consideration. The international guests went on tour for two afternoons to



see the extent of the earthquake damage to churches and main icons in the city. We also went to look at different churches operating after the earthquake and the innovative changes to ministry in Christchurch.

Sunday was a special closing service by the New Moderator and everyone dispersed with the sense of accomplishment and service. The theme was reminded to everyone again "JESUS IS THE HEART OF RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD AND PEOPLE" through our communion service and a very encouraging word by the Moderator the Rev Taimoanaifakaofo Kaio.

2. UNITING THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE, Sydney, Australia (30 October-3 November)

Monday Night

Arrived in Sydney airport at 10.30pm and was picked up by Rev Duncan MacLeod (United learning Network Director). My accommodation was in the guest complex in Yuraro House, Unit 9. There was housekeeping daily with breakfast food replenished on a daily basis.

Tuesday

Rev Duncan arrived early to pick me up for the planned program for the day. We discussed briefly the specific areas of interest that I wanted to know and see.

- Of interest was the Distant Learning Program and how that will benefit overseas students and those wishing to pursue studies in Australia.
- Accessibility by internet into the Library system, resources and materials.
- Availability to Short term/block courses during the year.
- Cross accreditation of our students by United Theological Colleges.
- Possible visits by Lecturers.

Meeting with Dr Gerard Moore (Academic Dean), was based around discussing the development of learning programs, what were Takamoa's current needs and how UTC could provide meeting and strengthening those needs. Christian Sorenson (Dean of Formation) was interested in helping our program. Fie Marino was the Cultural Representative in the College and he spoke about ways and means to reach young people.

Wednesday

The morning was spent in the Library with Moira Bryant. The library and its layout was maybe one of the best in the Pacific with over 40,000 books not including the magazines and articles. The display section was created with different themes throughout the year dependant on the celebration. The book section and layout were well indexed and easily visible to find books. There were sections for study areas and over 15 computers with internet access.

I was very interested in the software programs used in the Library and noted the accessibility of available software. We discussed the yearly fee for United Theological Students and the availability of Takamoa students accessing the Library, software programs and data base. The librarian Moira Bryant was very helpful and greatly assisted me in showing their operating system and cataloguing.

Thursday

This morning was spent in the library looking at books and doing additional reading in one area that caught my attention the day before. I was particularly interested in the Eco Theology Section as the library constantly purchases books every month to keep up to date.

Friday

The Open Multi Cultural Evening was attended by several student body ethnic groups. These groups were Tonga, Tokelau, Samoan, Korean, Chinese. The Cook Islands were invited guests and were number two on the program. The evening commenced with teaching carried out on different subjects to which people could choose which one they wanted to attend.



A multi-cultural service was conducted by the students and the Message brought by Rev Fie MarIno. This was followed by a feast of five pigs and delicious Island food which was provided by a Tongan group. The entertainment commenced with a dance by a Tongan student. Orometua Bronson Tanga brought his church youth and performed three numbers. This was received by the College with glad hearts and they were happy with the Cook Islands participation. The night finished well and all were delighted with the Cook Islands performance and attendance. I spent time with the college leaders briefly to thank them for the invitation to attend and their hospitality.

Saturday

Left Sydney for Auckland, New Zealand and stayed one night with Orometua Richard and Rere Mataara before flying to Fiji to attend the PTC Special Council Meeting.

3. SPECIAL PACIFIC THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE COUNCIL MEETING (5-9 November)

Arrival

Arrived Sunday evening into a very humid and hot Nandi airport. Continued on to Suva. Brother Sereki (maintenance manager PTC) was kind enough to transport me to PTC. A staff member advised me on arrival that meals will be provided and led me to the accommodation.

Monday

Devotion was held in the chapel and was conducted by Archbishop George Takeli (Anglican Church of Melanesia) and ministered from the text Mark 1:1-27. The message was entitled "The Capernaum Context for Mission." Archbishop expressed the importance Academic Development, Prayer Life and Extra Curriculum. Meeting concluded and all council members made their way to the conference room for the Special Council Meeting.

Meeting

The meeting commenced at 9.30am with a prayer by the Chairman of the PTC Council, Rev Elder Dr L Faalevao who welcomed all council members to this special meeting and outlined the Monday program. Role Call and Apologies were carried out by the Secretary of the PTC Council, Dr Tessa Mackenzie.

Academic Dean Presentation of Candidates

Presentation of PTC graduates' names and achievements were presented to the Council Members by the Academic Dean, Rev Dr Gwayaweng Kiki. There were 13 graduates in four (4) levels.

- 1: Certificate 3
- 2: Bachelor Degree 1
- 3: Masters Degree 8
- 4: Doctorate 1

The graduation of the mentioned students will take place on Thursday.

Report on the Pacific Ecumenical Community / Pacific Ecumenical Council

The Formation Process was presented by Rev James Bhagwan (Secretary Elect). Pastor Francois Philaatae introduced Rev James Bhagwan as the newly elected Secretary of PCC and indicated that he would take up office in January 2019 and would present this report. Rev Bhagwan's recommendation from PCC was that the PTC Council endorse PEC Framework and Process and receive a further report and recommendation in 2019.

Appointment of the Principal

The Meeting moved to what the Council regarded as the main agender. A report from the Review committee was given by Dr Tessa Mackenzie on the process the review committee carried out. The committee comprised of Mr Apisalome Tudreu, Dr Richard Wah and Dr Tessa Mackenzie. Of the four (4) applicants a short list was done and the committee agreed to interview two applicants. Rev Dr Douglas Estes and Rev Dr Upolu Vaai. The interview team considered leadership experience and understanding of the complexities of the role of Principal. After much deliberation, the council approved Rev Dr Upolu Vaai to take over from Rev. Dr Feleterika Nokise as the next PTC Principal, effective January 2019.



Tuesday

The day commenced with a Communion Service held in the chapel and was conducted by Rev Dr Professor Feleterika Nokise. A very moving service that included the student's choir, reading and partaking of the communion. The message was delivered by Rev Dr Professor Feleterika Nokise and was primarily directed to the graduating students. The message was entitled "Be an Authentic Christian Voice Today." The text was from John 13:12-17. The message covered the Gentleness and Humility, Faithfulness and Discipleship, Courteous and Long Suffering.

Council Meeting

The meeting commenced by the Chairman welcoming the Principal elect Rev Dr Upolu Vaai and his Mrs Vaai. Each of the Council members shared an encouraging word which was very inspiring and encouraging. Rev Dr Vaai responded and spoke about the honour entrusted upon him by the fathers of the church and was humbled by the responsibility and position given. He shared of his history, vision and heart. It was clear by the discussion afterwards with Council that the right decision had been made.

Meeting with SPATS

Following Lunch, Rev Rusi Tuidrakulu and I went to the South Pacific Association Theological Schools (SPATS) office. The areas discussed were....

- Accreditation Standards what is the process of becoming accredited?
- Membership how do we become active members? What are the annual costs?

Evening Program – College Farewell Feast

This gathering was a feast for the following:

- Rev Dr Feleterika Nokesi and family after twenty (20) years' service
- Rev Dr Isaac leaving college
- Graduating students leaving college

The program including gifts to everyone leaving and gifts given by those leaving to the school. Prizes and gifts were also presented to students for certain achievements within the school. Entertainment and presentations were done by 11 different ethnic groups within the college. Rev Dr Feleterika Nokise spent time giving gifts to the Chairman of the Council and his good lady, to the departing Lecturer and to the College. Final prayer was said at 11:45pm.

Wednesday

A meeting with the Principal elect, Rev Dr Upolu Vaai, was held mid-morning in which he committed to offer assistance to Takamoa. He also indicated he would like to visit all the Council churches, meet the Leaders, share of his vision for PTC and to reconnect with other Pacific Theological Colleges.

The discussion was on the following areas

- Degree studies to potential Takamoa students.
- Takamoa students enrolling in the degree program following completion of Diploma studies.
- Possible enrolment to Masters and Doctorate Program.
- Long Distance Learning opportunities for Takamoa students showing potential to higher education.
- Access to Library and resources.

I found Rev Dr Vaai very humble and sincere to renew our fellowship again.

Meeting with MISSION

Met with Pastor Dr Traugott Farnbacher of Mission from Germany. He is frequent visitor to the Pacific in the role of Mission coordinator for their mission organisation. He is also highly sort after as a Theological Teacher and specialises in Reformation Theology and Homiletics. Discussion was around a visit to the Cook Islands to possibly do a one week teaching in 2020.

Thursday

Graduation Day

The graduation was held in the afternoon and was attended by many family, church and community members. The Principal from Malua came specifically for the graduation and witnessed his previous students' graduation with Master's Degrees and a Doctor of Philosophy. The graduation was a formal affair with the student body,



faculty and PTC Council marching in the drums. Speeches and well wishes were conducted in the program followed by a light meal.

Friday

Departed early in the morning and caught flight to Nadi and then on to New Zealand.

Reflection

The installation of the new Principal was a reflection of the important role of the PTC Council, which the Cook Islands Christian Church is part of. In fact, the founding churches are the owners of PTC and we a part of the governing authority. The expectation of the Council Churches was to see its own members produce potential candidates for the Office of Principal. The strong persuasion of the Ecumenical fellowship was consistently reiterated throughout the meetings.

14. MOTU KOITABU RUGBY LEAGUE TEAM VISIT TO RAROTONGA



Kia Orana,

This is a brief Report of the Motu Koita Lagatois rugby league tour to the Cook Islands from 22nd Oct. to 04th Nov. 2018.

How did the Lagatois find about the Cook Islands to plan a trip?

The idea of the Cooks Islands tour was initially discussed in 2017 after the Motu Koita Lagatois' participation in the Southern Confederate Championships. The SC championships in itself a success story for the Motu Koita Rugby League (MKRL) as this was the Lagatois' inaugural and first ever participation in a national championship as an association and a league affiliated to the PNGRFL.

Further correspondences and dialogue was pursued by Kila Mala through his established relationship with the President of Cook Islands Rugby League (CIRL), Mr Charles Carlson and as the saying goes 'the rest is history'. Through the gentlemen's correspondence we were advised that there was an opportunity for the Motu Koita Lagatois to partipate in the annual Tri-Series tournament was which traditionally contested between the Cooks Residents XIII, Ozzy Cooks and NZ Cooks. However, with the NZ Cooks not participating in 2018, the Lagatois could have a chance to be included in their place.

We finally received a letter from CIRL through the President Charles Carlson on 18th April 2018, officially inviting Motu Koita Rugby League to participate in the Tri-Series in Cook Islands. It was all joy for us and the beginning of the preparation of the Lagatois team and planning for this historical tournament.

Our deepest gratitude and appreciation goes to CIRL for this giving us the opportunity and the privilege to send our MKRL national team, the 'Motu Koita Lagatois' to Cook Islands.

What was the purpose of the trip?

Apart from the Tri-Series rugby league tournament, the purpose of the trip was twofold:

1. It gave MKRL the opportunity to showcase our players at international rugby league and gain as much experience and exposure from these games. MKRL have short and long term plans for the league



and its players, and this tournament falls within these plans. Some goals for MKRL like any other leagues, is to have its players selected for provincial teams in the national Digicel Cup competition, which is the pathway to being selected for the PNG Hunters in the Queensland Cup competition and to make it to the national team, PNG Kumuls. MKRL is also aiming to have its own franchise, the Motu Koita Lagatois, in the PNG Digicel Cup competition in 2020. This is a challenge in itself and will require corporate sponsorships and funding to realize this dream, however, we are confident that we will achieve this goal.

2. Another purpose of the trip which was equally important was to connect our roots to the first missionaries from Cook Islands who brought the Gospel to Papua during the 1800's. Reverend Ruatoka and his teachers were some of the first missionaries from the Pacific, especially from Cook Islands, to bring the gospel and light to our ancestors through the London Missionary Society (LMS). This trip gave our boys, who hail from the villages where the missionaries lived and visited including Hanuabada village, the opportunity to trace history and connect with the Churches and the people of Cook Islands.

How was the Lagatois related to the Cook Islands Christian Church?

The relationship between the Motu Koita Rugby League (Lagatois) and the Cook Islands Christian Church (CICC) goes back to 1800's through the missionaries when Reverend Ruatoka and his teachers, who brought the Gospel to our ancestors under LMS. Reverence Ruatoka and his teachers arrived on the shores of Papua in 1871 to preach and spread the Gospel to our people. Whilst he was welcomed by a very hostile reception, this did not deter him from his mission. He be-friended a local warrior by the name of Lakani Toi, and the two became very close friends. It was through his friend that he was welcomed by the people of Hanuabada village where he set up his base and spread the Word of God along the Motu and Koitabu villages, and throughout the region of Papua. Reverend Ruatoka lived and ate with our people and became part of our people and the communities. Rev Ruatoka passed away in Papua after so many years of missionary work and was buried in Gabagaba village outside Port Moresby. (Full account and details of Reverend Ruatoka's missionary work in Papua will be provided to CICC separately)

Reverend Ruatoka left a lasting legacy and is remembered by our people in so many ways including Peroveta songs, dramas, and names of people and places. Some schools and theological colleges are named after Rev Ruatoka in his memory. We also have a week of gospel and church celebrations in November each year to commemorate the arrival of Reverend Ruatoka and the London Missionary Society to Papua. We call these celebrations the "LMS Week" which is equivalent to the Gospel Day or Nuku in Cook Islands.

It is through Reverend Ruatoka and other missionaries that we have a connection and bond with the people of Cook Islands. Part of our development and progress was made possible by the work of the missionaries through the Gospel, and we thank the people of Cook Islands for sharing the Word of God and the light with us.

Part of the trip was to trace history and rekindle the connection and bonding with the people and the Churches of Cook Islands.

What's the teams overall view of the trip?

The overall view of the trip from the Team, the Association (MKRL) and our families and supporters at home has been nothing but overwhelming. This was the first ever international tour taken by the Lagatois and to win our game against the Ozzy Cooks (28-12) and draw with the Residents side (26-26) was a fantastic result for the team.

The games were live streamed (thanks to Vaka TV and PNG Ports) therefore our families and supporters were able to watch the games from home. The games were also reported in our national newspapers hence the games and results were read and known nationwide. We received so many positive feedbacks, comments and well wishes on the MKRL Facebook page.

The experience gained by the management, coaching staff and players from these games and from the tournament is huge, and we hope to build on these experiences for the future.

The team was also given the opportunities to explore the beauty of Cook Islands and everyone had a wonderful time. Apart from the Nuku celebration which was a highlight of the tour, the team also had the opportunities to tour the island, have boat cruises and go to the night clubs. Two of our team officials had the privilege to visit and spend a day at the jewel of Cook Islands – Aitutaki lagoons.

All in all, we had wonderful time and met so many wonderful people in the Cook Islands. The kaikais were beautiful and we thank the people of Cook Islands for making our stay memorable.

Teams view and thoughts on the Nuku (Gospel Day) celebration?

The Nuku (Gospel Day) was a highlight of the tour. It was a privilege and an honor to be part of the celebrations and watch the different items and performances by the various church groups and congregations. We were part of the Avarua CICC and our players took part in their performance or item which was awesome. I can say that our boys really enjoyed the day and enjoyed themselves and the team has returned with fond memories of the Nuku celebrations.

As mentioned earlier, we celebrate the LMS week in November to commemorate the arrival of the missionaries with gospel plays, peroveta singing, choir, sting bands, pacific dancing, and many more.





What's the teams thought/view about the Cook Islands people and if given another opportunity, will the team come back?

The people of Cook Islands are very beautiful and friendly. There are no other words to describe the friendliness of the people, the hospitality and outward caring attitude and joy that brings happiness and a welcoming feeling to strangers and visitors to the Island. We were very humbled by the kindness and hospitality we received from everyone during our stay in Cook Islands. We are very grateful and appreciate the hospitality and kaikai provided by the various churches and groups. We have made friends with so many people of Cook Islands and we believe some of these friendships will go a long way. There have been some ups and downs during the tour, but the good deeds outweigh the bad.

The purpose of their trip was to participate in a Tri-Series Rugby League Test Match organized by the Cook Islands Rugby League Association that is led by their President Carl Hunter. This Tri-Series involves the local based selection side Ratotonga Cook Islands and the Australian

based Cook Islands side, which were mainly from Sydney and Brisbane and then of-course the PNG side. The New Zealand based Cook Islands side did not make this Tri-Series event coordinated by the CIRLA as to why it was fixed to a Tri-Series.

The PNG Rugby League side is led and coached by a former National Rugby League icon David Wesley who played for Canberra Raiders back in the late 1980s and the early 90s. He played with the likes of Mal Meninga and also represented Australia selection side in the position as a winger. According to Wesley he was very blessed to be back in his home country teaching and coaching the game he is most passionate about which is Rugby League. On Wednesday the 24th of October at 7pm the Executive Committees and the Administration of the CICC alongside with the Takamoa Theological College hosted the PNG team dinner. This was also when they had their first match against the Australia Cook Islands side, which is why they arrived at 7.30pm. So they were coming off their first win in the competition 26-12 which was a great way to end their night. A formal welcoming was officiated for them by the Principal and the Takamoa students. Apiianga Mita Soa Tini did a traditional welcoming "turou" and the Mama Akaaere Makirau Saitu along with Mama Upokoina Ezekiela, Martha Soa Tini and Mamamere Tumu welcomed each of them with flower necklaces (eis).

Formal prayer devotion was convened by Papa Principal Rev Tere Marsters and assisted by Apiianga Ngariki Mare with the Bible reading and the prayer by Apiianga Campbell Ngatokoa. Once entered, the books were sorted into their correct places on the shelves. All the books have now been catalogued, and we are now spending time to make sure that our database and the books on the shelves are in line with each other.

It has been a huge task, but one that we have enjoyed immensely. We have been extremely excited to see the library come together, and look forward to our fellow students being able to use this great resource.









WORK PROGRAMS GATES REPAIRED

APIIANGA SPIRITUAL PROGRESS

The Apiianga commenced this year with an awesome task in facing a very busy and demanding year that would require a great amount of commitment._The year began with summer school which set the pace to a strong emphasis on their studies. Monitoring systems were implemented and put in place to identify individual development and the overall classroom development. This system allows individual weaknesses to appear and a proactive response to strengthen those weaknesses.

Furthermore, the targeted systems where necessary for the following implementation.

- Additional assignments for each subject. This will help the Apiianga expand their capacity in their writing skills
- Increase the word count for all assignments for the Principals classes from 2,500 to 3,500. This will better position the Apiianga in their thesis writing when working towards a degree in the future.
- Monitoring of classroom contact hours for each student to ensure their absentees from classes don't affect their overall grade for each subject.
- Implement a weekly assessment process to closely monitor students spiritual progress and development.
- Assess and identify learning weaknesses and difficulties on a weekly basis so as to strengthen each Apiianga in their spiritual development.

To ensure students are being proactive in their approach to their studies, a weekly assessment was implemented this semester.



As mentioned in the last newsletter, the classroom contact hours are imperative for students to achieve the required results. Low results are often a reflection of non-class attendance, poor study habits, laziness and distractions. Therefore, a stronger monitoring process to identify these areas are put into place.

Overall the students have been progressing well in all aspects of their practical and classroom studies. Absence and sickness over the year will indicate low grades and some Apiianga redoing subjects again. The Apiianga took additional studies throughout the year to catch up with necessary subjects not covered previously.





The overall assessment of the Apiianga for 2018

- The attendance to classes and Church services could have been better over the year and would need improvement.
- The lateness to class, neatness, dress code, haircuts and shaving for the Papa Apiianga needs was not consistent throughout the year and needs improvement.
- The interaction during classes has been very good, especially in 2nd Semester. Questions and contribution by Apiianga have been very good.
- Singing in Tereora College and the Takamoa Aiai services has been very good. However, the attitude and singing together needs to be consistent and not just at special events.
- Assignment writing as well as handing assignments on time has improved greatly throughout the year
 and the Apiianga have come a long way and have done very well. Some slight improvement in the
 structural presentation of their assignments as well as following the specific instructions and directives
 of the Lecture.
- The English class has improved over the year with good grades and results for the Papa Apiianga.
- The Apiianga have been very good in coping with the heavy study load and assignment work.
- Group presentation has improved and the Apiianga have completed some good projects and assignments as well as their Homiletic delivery and weekly sermons. The response to the workload has been good, however it needs to be approach by all the group and not just a few. There is room for improvement.
- The opportunities to Preach throughout the year by the Apiianga has been a way to improve their skill
 and abilities to communicate. The Apiianga have done extremely well in the Churches and other places
 throughout the year.
- Work duties has also been good over the year and has seen some projects completed, but would need
 improvement on starting on time and utilising the time given in the afternoons.
- The Apiianga have been good at caring and looking after their units, however the outside tidiness of their units needs to be consistent.
- The health of some of the students with ongoing medical issues are a concern because it has affected work duties, classes and Church attendance. Students would need to manage their medical issues and improve on a better approach to healthy living.

Overall the students have settle well into a study orientated attitude and have acomplished and progressed well throughout 2018. Theres room for improvement in being fully committed, consistent, respectful, humble and faithfull in 2019.



CHRISTMAS AND NEW YEARS

Takamoa will continue in supporting the Christmas and New Year's services in the Avarua CICC. Papa Ngateitei Rev Tuaine Ngametua has composed the Christmas and New Year songs for the Avarua Service. Camps on Christmas and New Year's day are planned for a well-deserved break over Christmas. The school commences with Summer school on the 14th January – 25th January 2019. 20. REFLECTIONS ON THE YEAR



his is the first time I will be presenting some reflections on the year that is about to be gone forever, never to return – here today, gone tomorrow. Sometimes we take it for granted with respect to certain events taking place and come to value them a lot more the day after, and the longer that day becomes (like 20, 50 years down the line), the more valuable the memories become as well.

Images of those events – history frozen in time, so to speak – certainly add to the value of those yester-years, like the images in the *Memory Lane* section of this paper from the 1960s and 1970s.

Sometimes we say to ourselves, *if only we can turn back the time, we would've done certain things differently or much better.* But, too late to be sorry as they say, so best to maximize use of the time available to us in terms of doing those things that will leave a legacy or two – or more – for future generations to learn from and perhaps try to take things to the next level. Anyway the below are just some of the year's highlights in selected CICC events that I am aware of. This means not everything that could've or should've been included in this section are included, partly because of my not being aware of them out there. And some of those events have indeed been captured already and presented in the past 3 issues of this year's paper, i.e. those published in March, June and September. There are no photos or images in this section, there are already heaps in this and other issues of the paper.

1. RECOVENING OF ACTIVITIES IN THE BRAHCNES

In most of the CICC's 70 branches in the Cook Islands, New Zealand and Australia, activities officially open or reconvene on the first Sunday of February – White Sunday, Oroa in the local languate. Referred to as *akatueraanga i te angaanga a te au mangamanga i roto i te Ekalesia*, it is also the time when new office bearers, if any, in the parish or any of the parish departments, are commissioned by the caretaker minister. While such activities have officially closed, or taken a break for the long end-of-year period as of the first Sunday of December, the normal worship programe and special Christmas and New Year branch programmes continue, including the week-long special prayer service in the firs week of January following the Oroa of that month. This is also the time when new traditional hymns are composed based on selected Bible verses, for the purpose of the festive season services, and for the week-long service a time devoted to preparing members spiritually for the year ahead.

2. COUNCIL MEETINGS

In those locations where there is more than 1 church branch, a council exists and meets on set dates to talk about management issues and church programmes specific to their branches. Some of those council meetings include the following:



- NZ CICC council October, held in Wellington
- Australia CICC Council September, held in Brisbane
- Rarotonga CICC Council every 2 months between February and December, rotates around the 6 branches on the island
- Outer islands as per their meeitngs programme
- States or regions in NZ and Aust as per their meetings programme

3. WORKSHOPS

These are held at all levels; within the church branch, at island or regional level, with esource persons being from within or outside of the church branch or council. Needless to say, such workshops discuss aspects relating to their specific roles and responsibilities.

4. GOSPEL DAYS

For the past 100 years or so, the arrival of the Gospel to the Cook Islands in 1821 on the island of Aitutaki have been commemorated by the church. Then in the 1970s, Government at the time saw fit to turn that particular day (26 October) into a National Public Holiday for everyone to enjoy and appreciate such a milestone in the country's history. In addition to the above day, individual islands also commemorate the day that the Gospel actually reached their islands. So in addition to the National Gospel Day of 26 October, each of the islands also commemorate their own Gospel Day as follows:

25 July 1823 Rarotonga Aitutaki 26 October 1821 15 June 1824 Mangaia 19 July 1823 Atiu 23 July 1823 Mauke 22 July 1823 Mitiaro Manihiki 8 August 1849 15 August 1849 Rakahanga Penrhyn 13 March 1857 Pukapuka 6 December 1857

Palmerston 1863

There are images elsewhere in this issue of the paper from the National Gospel Day – known locally as Nuku – commemorated here on Rarotong last October at Ngatangiia.

5. BRANCH VISITATIONS

The CICC Executive Council has a programme in place involving visiting the church branches outside of Rarotonga as often as it could, depending on funds and personnel availability. Such visits took place to Melbourne in August for a workshop, Brisbane in September for the Australia Council meeting, Wellington in October for the NZ Council meeting, Atiu for a meeting with the branch there and to confirm the assembly venue for 2019, Aitutaki in November for the bestowing of Queen's Award badges to uniform organization recipients, Mauke for the Youth Convention, and Ranui and Motutapu branches in Auckland in October for meetings. Unfortunately, not all branches are able to be visited, and its almost an impossible task for the northern islands branches due to lack of regular transport.

6. CHURCH ASSEMBLIES

The CICC's participation was requested for the following church assemblies, and representations were by the stated personnel:

- <u>June</u>, Melbourne, Uniting Church in Australia Rev. Mata Makara of the Hampton Park branch in Melbourne
- October, Daru, PNG, United Church in Papua New Guinea Rev. Tinirau Soatini, chairman of the committee of ministers on the CICC Executive Council; his write-up is elsewhere in this paper



- October, Auckland, Pacific Conference of Churches CICC President, CICC General Secretary, CICCNZ Youth Secretary, CICCNZ Women's Fellowship Secretary; their write-up is elsewhere in this paper.
- October, Christchurch, NZ, Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand Rev. Tere Marsters, Principal, Takamoa Theological College; his write-up is elsewhere in this paper

7. REGIONAL CHURCH MEETINGS AT LEADERS' LEVEL

- April, Pacific Church Leaders' Meeting (PCLM), Auckland, facilitated by the Pacific Conference of Churches – Nga Mataio, CICC Secretary General, write-up in the June issue of this paper
- <u>November</u>, Special PTC Council Meeting, Suva Rev. Tere Marsters, Takamoa College Principal, write-up elsewhere in this issue

8. RELIGIOUS ADVISORY COUNCIL

On Rarotonga, this meeting comprising of the 6 main denominations in the country (CICC, LMS, SDA, AoG, Apostolic, LDS) is held every 2 months between February and December, to discuss issues and programmes concerning the organization and its members. It is responsible for organizing the 2 annual thanksgiving services (in April and November) that are held in the National Auditorium, have a part in the annual Te Maire Nui programme and other events that Government may want inputs from the religious sector. It was formed in 1975 and its management rotates annually amongst the 12-member council (2 from each church).

9. MANAGEMENT OF CHURH AFFAIRS

Apart from its biennial assembly, the CICC Council is the highest decision-making body of the church and has a clear mandate in respect of its duties and responsibilities. It meets on average every 6 weeks to discuss issues and concerns raised and map out a clear direction on the way forward. So for this year, the council met 7 times to deal with matters concerning management problems in the branches, the ministers' 4-year rotation programme, and others. The council also makes use of other departments and councils by passing onto them issues that are specific to them. Dealing with inter-denominational and international affairs concerning the church is part and parcel of the council's terms of reference.

10. HEAD OFFICE ADMINISTRATION

As in past years, I'm very grateful to my small but hard-working 4-man team for their tireless efforst in dealing with admin-related matters which include the following:

- Preparation and payment of accounts
- Finalisation, printing and distribution of annual publications daily readings card (Tia), Pure Epetoma, Karere; also other printing requirements such as those of the Takamoa Theological College
- Daily correspondences with the church branches including responding to requests for things such as certificates, old records, etc.
- Maintaing contacts with the church's partner organisations
- Secretariat for the CICC Executive Council

11. DEDICATION OF NEW BRANCHES

For this year, one new branch was dedicated in early November after being an apprentice for the past 12 years; Ekalesia Mid Canterbury in Ashburton, South Island, NZ. A write-up of that event is elsewhere in this issue. The next one coming up is most probably one based in Brisbane, Australia, in April 2019. There are already 2 other church branches in Brisbane and one in nearby Gold Coast.

12. CHURCH NEWSLETTER

The paper was commenced in September 2005; it was a monthly publication then. But after a couple of years, it became clear that a paper every 2 months was good enough. Then about 5 years ago, a paper on a quarterly basis sounded like a much better idea. This year 3 were issued; in March, June and September with



this number 72 being the last for the year. Regular reminders to all 70 branches are issued via email inviting contributions. I'm grateful to those who have contributed to the issues of this year, first-timers as well as the regular ones like the author of "Te Rara Olive." Putting the articles together in this paper is not for the faint-hearted, certainly not for those whose level of patience is only that much. While it is not a hard job, the time-consuming aspect that comes with it can certainly be off-putting at times. Many thanks once again to those who have helped keep the paper afloat by submitting articles.

13. PREPARATION FOR THE 2019 ASSEMBLY

This task over the past years commences almost immediately after the closing of each assembly. That means preparations for the 2019 assembly began in September 2017 after the 2017 assembly closed in July. Preparatory activities this year include dialoguing with the proposed host Ekalesia (Atiu) and setting in motion the necessary workplan and information paper which responds to all queries associated with the biennial event. All members are regularly updated on preparations by email to avoid last minute rushing around, the last update by way of a monthly workplan being released on the first day of this month December.

14. OTHER NOTABLE EVENTS

Other events worth mentioning here which took place during the year includes the following:

- CICC Women's Conference in April held here on Rarotonga; write-up in the June issue
- CICC Youth Convention in April held in Mauke; write-up in the June issue
- Visit in October by PNG league team who came from places where the early Cook Islands Missionaries went; write-up elsewhere in this issue
- Visit by YWAM International officials in June; write-up in the September issue
- Annual Te Maeva Nui cultural festival at the National Auditorium in July/August which the CICC had a
 major role in the week-long programme in terms of the nightly devotion before and after the shows,
 choir and traditional hymns competition, etc.
- Choir competition by the 6 Rarotonga CICC Youth groups held here at Takamoa in November

15. IN SUM

Like other years, this year has been a mixture of things; challenges in terms of responding to issues and problems in the church branches, the Executive having to discipline some church personnel, timely response to communications, dealing with those outside of the church, timely distribution of whatever people request the office, and a few others that need not be mentioned here. 1. PAINTING OF JESUS REMAINS UNTOUCHED AS 150-YEAR-OLD CHURCH BURNS DOWN

A 150-year-old church in Wakefield, Mass., was engulfed in flames on Tuesday after being struck by lightning during a storm. Remarkably, the one thing to survive the blaze was a large painting of Jesus.

The fire was first reported on Tuesday evening, when members of the church were meeting inside. Everyone evacuated the burning building safely, but it took hours and more than 100 firefighters to tame the flames destroying the First Baptist Church. People from the community were reluctantly saying goodbye to the community landmark, built in 1872, as it burned to the ground, when one first responder emerged from the structure with a painting that was miraculously undamaged.

According to the Boston Globe, the painting of Jesus hadn't been marked by fire, smoke, or water when it was found in the rubble. How it survived is a mystery.


Representatives from the church didn't immediately respond to Yahoo Lifestyle's request for comment. However, the Globe reports that the painting will be given to a former pastor of the church. The First Baptist Church has since set up a GoFundMe page, and posted a statement on its website.

"We know that we serve a God who specializes in restoring brokenness and who can bring beauty even from ashes," the statement reads. "So we move into the future with trust, hope, and gratitude."

3. MASSIVE AUSTRALIAN COW NEARLY AS TALL AS MICHAEL JORDAN

A cow in Western Australia has gone *udderly* viral due to its sheer size and stature. Knickers, a 7-year-old male Holstein-Friesian cow, clocks in at a whopping six feet three inches tall — just three inches shy of NBA



legend Michael Jordan — and weighs 3,086 pounds, earning him the unofficial title of largest steer in Australia.

To put his size in perspective, a fully-mature Holstein-Friesian cow weighs about 1,500 pounds and stands at four feet eight inches tall at the shoulder, according to The Cattle Site. Bulls usually max out at around five feet nine inches tall and can weigh upwards of 2,200 pounds.

While Knickers dwarfs the average Holstein-Friesian in both heigh and weight, he is still a



couple inches smaller than the Guinness World Record-holder for tallest steer: A Chianina ox named Bellino, who measured over six feet six inches tall in Rome in 2010.

Still, Knickers' impressive size has garnered him global attention, leading many to wonder what fate may befall the behemoth bovine.

Knickers' owner, Geoff Pearson, told Perth Now that the massive cow has officially been spared from the chopping block — but not due to his newfound celebrity status, as one might think.

"It was too heavy. I wouldn't be able to put it through a processing facility," he told the outlet. "So I think it will just live happily ever after." Off to greener pastures, indeed.

"It is my considered judgment that you should now resign. I expect in your lonely, embattled position this would seem to you as an act of disloyalty from one you have supported and helped in so many ways. My own view is that I would now ill serve a president, whose massive accomplishments I will always respect and whose family I love, if I did not now give you my judgment." — August 1974, speaking to President Richard Nixon shortly before he resigned, when Bush was Republican national chairman.

"And my opponent won't rule out raising taxes. But I will. And the Congress will push me to raise taxes, and I'll say no, and they'll push, and I'll say no, and they'll push again. And I'll say to them: Read my lips. No new taxes." — Aug. 18, 1988, during his acceptance speech at the Republican National Convention.



"We know what works: Freedom works. We know what's right: Freedom is right. We know how to secure a more just and prosperous life for man on Earth: through free markets, free speech, free elections and the exercise of free will unhampered by the state." — Jan. 20, 1989, during his inaugural address.

5. <u>DUTCH COURT RULES 69-YEAR-OLD MAN CAN'T LEGALLY DECLARE HIMSELF 20 YEARS YOUNGER</u>

A 69-year-old Dutch man has failed in his attempt to legally declare himself 20 years younger. Last month, motivational speaker Emile Ratelband filed a lawsuit against the Dutch government requesting that his date of birth be switched from March 11, 1949, to March 11, 1969.

On Monday, a court in the Netherlands city of Arnhem rejected his age-changing application, saying that while Ratelband "is at liberty to feel 20 years younger than his real age and to act accordingly," actually changing the birth certificate is not possible.

"Amending his date of birth would cause 20 years of records to vanish from the register of births, deaths, marriages and registered partnerships. This would have a variety of undesirable legal and societal implications," the court said, according to the New York Post.



Ratelband initially wanted to drop two decades off his age in order to improve his chances on Tinder. "I feel much younger than my age, I am a young god, I can have all the girls I want but not after I tell them that I am 69," Ratelband told AFP. "I feel young, I am in great shape and I want this to be legally recognized because I feel abused, aggrieved and discriminated against because of my age."

He compared his attempt to turn back the clock to identifying as transgender. "We live in a time when you can change your name and change your gender. Why can't I decide my own age?" he asked, according to the BBC.

In its ruling, the court said that the changes to the law that allow a person to change their gender took place after the issue was debated globally, and noted Ratelband is the only person advocating for legal age change, according to the BBC.

The court ruling said Ratelband had other legal means at his disposal if he truly felt he was a victim of age discrimination.

They chose the town of Mexico Beach, Florida, as their vacation locale. The Panhandle community had a

Steel cables ran from the eaves down to the ground to make sure that the roof would stay attached. The walls themselves were made of 12 inches of reinforced concrete, with durable siding to armor the outside layer. And that wasn't even the first line of defense.

While the hurricane leveled nearly all the other structures in the vicinity, The Sand Palace still stood strong. The storm took over 30 lives and tore apart homes and businesses, and yet one house right on the water looked seemingly no worse for the wear.

KINURA TAPUNUI MUSIC FESTIVAL

One of the coordinators of the above event, William Framhein, was kind enough to forward the below info for the event proposed for Saturday 15 December at the Te Atukura Ground, Tutakimoa, Rarotonga.



Introduction

Over the last few decades, there has been a noticeable erosion of values and attitudes among our youth on Rarotonga from cultural shifts, and likely attributed to less family time spent together, more social media influences and technological distractions as well as increased temptations from the 'clubbing scene' where alcohol and drugs are present. Indeed, there is a need to innovatively address these issues, perhaps by mimicking some of these attractive temptations with a positive spin and safer family environment; the church pathway is certainly one avenue that can provide this.

The "Kīnura Tapunui Music Festival" is a proposed Christian youth event to be held annually on Rarotonga in December. The event is proposed by members of the Christian community, local NGO Kōrero o te 'Ōrau (who focuses on indigenous issues), and the Matariki Communications Charitable Trust to celebrate the reason for the season – Jesus Christ who is our gateway to salvation – through music and song. Kīnura is the name for harp in the Cook Islands Māori Bible; Tapunui refers to a state of being holy or sacred. Psalms 98: 5 reads "Sing unto the Lord with the harp; with the harp, and the voice of a psalm". This verse embodies the goal of the Festival, which is to praise the Lord through music and singing.

The proposed festival will be a non-denominational Christian event, alcohol & smoke free, with lots of activities for the family. The festival will provide our young and upcoming performers the opportunity to showcase their

talent alongside established local performing artists such as Ephraim & Kimi Taokia, Tuaine Papatua, Tara Kauvai, Teata Nga, Jarome Pare, Natua Teururai, Katreena Smith and more.

The event has the endorsement of the Religious Advisory Council (RAC). Non-members of the RAC also support the event and most have confirmed the participation of their respective youth groups. Local musicians on Rarotonga, the Ministry of Health, the Ministry of Cultural and Development, and the Ministry of Internal Affairs Youth Division have offered their support as well. We will also seek the support of other Agencies such as the National Environment Service to help with waste disposal issues, and the Cook Islands Red Cross for First Aid care during the event. There will be no entry fee as we hope that costs to host this festival will come from donations and sponsorship. Food sales will be limited to vendors of church youth groups to assist with their fundraising efforts.

OBJECTIVES

- i. To provide a safe and positive environment where our youth can express themselves through music and song.
- 2. To lead all youth to the Lord Jesus Christ for the "Free Gift of Salvation" through music.
- 3. To promote family and Christian values through evangelism with a guest speaker.
- 4. To inspire and encourage our young performers.
- 5. To provide an opportunity to strengthen the respective youth groups within our local churches.
- 6. To provide an opportunity for youth groups to fundraise.

ACTIVITIES

- Arts and crafts and food sales during the day for Christian youth groups to fundraise
- Face painting, bouncy castle, and activities with CIFA will be conducted in Kids Activity Area (see map)
- Music will be played from early afternoon starting at 1 pm until 10 pm in the evening

LONG-TERM PLAN

We envision this becoming an annual event that will grow to include overseas Christian Youth groups and Christian artists who would like to be a part of this festival. The hosting of this festival may be rotated among the three *vaka*, with the inaugural event hosted by *Te Au o Tonga* at Te Atukura grounds in Parekura (see map below). As the event grows, we anticipate running the festival over a few days. Currently, we have the support (both financial and in-kind) from local businesses, churches, and Government Ministries and we are still accepting donations to help us get this first event off the ground.

MEMORY LANE



CALL OF THE APOSTLES

(They trod the dusty roads of Galilea – An Independent Study on the Apostles of Christ)

PART 6 (continued from last newsletter)

Bartholomew - A Sermon from Silence



In the list of the apostles found in Mark (3:16-19), Matthew (10:2-4), Luke (6:14-16) and Acts (1:13) the name of Bartholomew appears. However, there is no further reference to him in the New Testament. While it is characteristic of the Scriptures to emphasize the message and not the man, it seems extraordinary that no information be given about one of the pillars of the Church. Perhaps there is a solution to the concern. Sometime in the ninth century AD, a man named Elias of Damascus set forth the proposition that Bartholomew could be identified with Nathanael. (John 1:45-51) Since then, many reputable scholars have agreed and contend that Bartholomew is Nathanael for the

following reasons.

Bartholomew is not a first name, but a distinguishing second name. The word *Bar* means *son of.* Perhaps the apostle was Nathanael Bartholomew or Nathanael, the son of Tolmai. (2 Sam. 13:37)

The first three gospels Matthew, Mark, and Luke never mention Nathanael while John's gospel never mentions Bartholomew. When Nathanael is mentioned in the fourth gospel, he is spoken of in such a way that he is an apostle. (John 1:43-51, John 21:2) Nathanael was with Peter, James, John, and Thomas when they met with the Master following His resurrection.

In the lists of The Twelve the names of Philip and Bartholomew always occur together as if it were natural to speak of them in such a manner. It was Philip who brought Nathanael to Christ.

If Bartholomew is Nathanael then the total silence of Scripture is broken and we learn something about the man beginning with his friendship with Philip. Most people meet many others in life who are very special, but true friendship is rare. It is tested in fires of disappointment and disagreement. It is also manifested in whether or not someone has the best interest of the other person in mind. Philip had the best interest of Nathanael in his heart for he tried to bring him to Christ. Because you truly care for someone, bring them to Christ.

When Philip informed Nathanael of his own great discovery, (John 1:45) he was skeptical and asked, *Can there any good thing come out of Nazareth?* It was not pride or prejudice that prompted this immediate response but a deep sense of personal shame. Nathanael was also a Galilean and as such felt the social stigma of his day. Nathanael knew all too well how the people of Judea felt toward Galileans and so he wondered if the Messiah could really come from among the poor and obscure part of Palestine.

Had Nathanael known the Scriptures better, he might have realized that it was prophesied that Jesus would be as a *root out of a dry ground*. (Isa. 53:2) It was foretold the Suffering Savior would have no physical beauty that people should desire Him. (Isa. 53:3). He would be despised and rejected of men, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief. (Isa. 53:3) *Can any good thing come out of Nazareth?* asked Nathanael. *Come and see,* said Philip. (John 1:46) Nathanael came to Christ and was shocked to see the Lord in His splendor and glory for immediately Nathanael learned something about Jesus: He was all knowing.

As soon as Jesus saw Nathanael He said three things about him:

1. The Lord commended his faith. Behold, an Israelite indeed! What did Christ mean? He meant that in Nathanael there was genuine faith for, Not all Israel is Israel. According to Scripture, the true Israelite is the person who has the faith of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. A true Israelite is a person who is seriously religious.



To draw a modern day parallel, it could be said of someone in this generation, *There is a Christian, who is a Christian indeed,* The meaning would be clear. There are those who take the Christian life seriously.

- a. The Bible is read and meditated upon.
- b. A local church is identified with and supported with spiritual gifts
- c. Missionaries are supported
- d. There is gospel obedience to the ordinance of baptism
- e. The hour of worship is longed for
- f. Christ is loved and God is worshipped in spirit and in truth
- g. Souls are sought out for salvation
- h. The Scriptures are diligently studied
- i. A life of prayer is found to be pleasant and profitable

There are Christians indeed, and there were Israelites, indeed.

- 2. <u>Jesus commended Nathanael for his virtue</u>. Nathanael was not only religious but he was righteous. He was a child of grace and part of the covenant blessings. He was fortunate to have escaped the pollution of this world with vices that haunt the heart and destroy the happiness of the soul. He was not a weak man who wanted to love virtue, but found himself enslaved to some sin. He was good and decent and upright but he still needed salvation because good works can never justify a person in the sight of God. Virtue can be commended, but it does not save.
- 3. The Lord commended Nathanael for his transparency. Behold an Israelite indeed, in whom is no guile [or deceit]. There was no subtlety in Nathanael like there was in other men such as the patriarch Jacob.

Jacob tricked his father Isaac and stole the family blessing by deceit. Nathanael was a clear as crystal in his conscience and that was reflected in his countenance. David, king of Israel, described the guileless man in Psalm 15.

When Nathanael heard the assessment of Christ upon his life, he was astonished and responded to the flattery with amazement. *How do you know me?* he asked, and learned something about the deity of Christ. The Lord knows what is in all men just like He knows what is in your heart and mine.

The Lord knows who you are, and what you really want in life, but also what you are doing every moment of every hour of the day. *Nathanael*, said Christ, *i saw you when you were under the fig tree*.

The fig tree is used in Scripture symbolically to refer to Israel as a nation (Matt. 24:32) because under the fig tree pious Jews would go to pray and mediate. Under the shade of the tree Nathanael thought no one would notice if he communed with God but under the fig tree the King in His beauty saw Nathanael. Has the Lord ever seen you under the fig tree? Do you have a shady place of spiritual rest where you go to be with God? Do you have a sacred spot somewhere to pray and meditate with the King of Glory?

William Law in his book, A Serious Call, offers this counsel. Pray always in the same place: reserve that place for devotion, and never allow yourself to do anything common in it.

- 1. Adam and Eve once had a shady place in Paradise where, in the cool of each evening they walked with the Lord.
- 2. Isaac had a shady place in the green field at even tide.
- 3. Elijah had a special place in the mountain cave.
- 4. Jesus had a special place in the Garden of Gethsemane.

As Jesus spoke, the heart of Nathanael opened up and he made a great confession manifesting a converted heart as he said, *Rabbi, thou art the Son of God; thou art the king of Israel.* And Jesus smiled. *Nathanael, do you now believe? i know you believe and because of that, i will show you greater thing.* Faith is always rewarded with more faith. *Nathanael, hereafter, ye shall see the heavens open, and the angels of God, ascending and descending upon the Son of God. Now follow me.* (John 1:51)

With Philip, Nathanael followed Christ and so was present when the omnipotent power of Christ was manifested following the Lord's resurrection. The story is told in John 21. In a final meal, Jesus fed His faithful disciples



from His own abundant resources and they were satisfied. (John 21:6) And so we have two cameo appearances of Nathanael. At the beginning of the Lord's ministry he was a witness to omniscience and omnipresence. At the end of the Lord's ministry he was an eyewitness to His omnipotence. These things become compelling reasons, for many, to accept the proposition that Nathanael is Bartholomew and one of the Twelve Apostles. However, to be honest, biblical scholars are not united in this matter. The *Encyclopedia of Religion* notes that...*identification with Nathanael in John 1:45 is only conjectural.* Here are the logical concerns of identifying Nathanael as Bartholomew.

It was 800 years before Christians made a linkage between Nathanael and Bartholomew, which leads to a word of warning. New ideals and insights into the Scriptures unheard of by previous generations should always be suspect. That is how error is born and breeds heresy.

A basic principle of Biblical study is to speak when the Scriptures speak and to be silent when the Scriptures are silent. Novel interpretations of the Bible are enjoyable and interesting but usually unprofitable to the soul. If God the Holy Spirit wanted to say more about Bartholomew, He would have done so. The man as well as his message would have been made plainer. And yet, there is a sermon from silence. There are practical lessons to be learned.

In the kingdom of God, the first shall be last and the last shall be first. Today, the apostles are honored. Special holy days are set aside as their names adorn religious structures throughout the world. The last is now first. And yet, the silence that initially surrounded Bartholomew testifies that he did not mind being obscure if Jesus Christ was exalted. He was not out to make a name for himself in the world of religion, he only wanted to preach Christ.

Those who are worthy of honor can be dishonored by unworthy deeds committed in their name. Perhaps you have heard of the St. Bartholomew Massacre. It is a matter of history that on August 24, 1572 the Catholic Church began a great massacre of Huguenots in France on St. Bartholomew's Day. The Huguenots were French Calvinist Protestants. More than 30,000 men, women, and children were killed without mercy with the approval of King Charles IX under the influence of his mother, Catherine de Medici.

In the kingdom of God there are many unsung heroes of the faith. Countless Sunday School Teachers, pastors of small churches, missionaries on foreign fields, and shut ins will never be recognized in this world. There are many gifted people who go unloved, un-rewarded, and unwanted by the world.

Hebrews 11 speaks of nameless saints who: "...had trials of cruel mockings and scourgings, yea moreover of bonds and imprisonment: they were stoned, they were sawn asunder, were tempted, were slain with the sword; they wandered about in sheepskin and goatskins; being destitute, afflicted, tormented; of whom the world was not worthy...." Bartholomew represents all the silent souls who are unknown to men but who are well known to God.

In the final analysis, to have one's name on the roll of the Book of Life is reward enough. In Revelation 20 a terrifying scene is witnessed. John sees all of the dead standing before the final judgment of Christ.

There is a Great White Throne and on the throne sits the Son of God. He lifts up His eyes and beholds millions upon billions of souls for all of humanity stands before Him. The face of each person is intent upon the throne. An angel flies overheard. He is carrying a large scroll. With majestic solemnity the angel hands the scroll to the Lord. Slowly the scroll is unrolled. Ears strain as individual names are called. By each name there is the record of human deeds. and they were judged every man according to their own works. And whosoever was not written in the Book of Life was cast into the Lake of Fire

It is not wrong for each person to ask, *Is my name written in the Book of Life? Does heaven have a record of my holy works?* While salvation is by grace through faith apart from works, we will be judged for the deeds done in our body, both good and evil. Jesus told the Apostles, *rejoice because your names are written in heaven.* (Luke 10:20) Bartholomew's name was written in the *Book of Life*. It is enough.

Despite the absence of concrete information about Bartholomew in the biblical narrative there are some obvious things, which can be noted.



Bartholomew was a privileged man. In the providence of God, Bartholomew was numbered among the chosen twelve to be a pillar of the New Testament church. The Lord God is sovereign. He has a right to make and create whom He wills and how He wills. Every individual exists at the good pleasure of His will. We are appointed our appropriate place in the Divine decree of things. Bartholomew's place was as an apostle.

Not only was Bartholomew a privileged man because of his place in the kingdom of heaven, but he was privileged because of what he was a witness to. Bartholomew was present when Jesus preached a sermon to a large crowd gathered on a mountainside. He was standing nearby when Jesus touched the blind and made people see, spoke to the cripple and made them walk. He watched in awe when Jesus spoke at a funeral and the dead lived. Bartholomew sat at the table of the Lord's Last Supper. He touched Jesus, prayed with Him, and learned the great lessons of life. The mercy of God fell greatly upon Bartholomew and he did not prove to be unworthy of the Divine mercies.

Bartholomew was faithful unto death. As we turn to the legends that surround the name of Bartholomew care is taken for many fantastic things are claimed about each of the apostles.

There are three places Bartholomew is alleged to have ministered:

- He is said to have ministered in India. The early church historian Eusebius and Jerome record a story associated with Bartholomew in India. (Eusebius, *The Ecclesiastical History*, 5,10,3; Jerome, *Concerning Illustrious Men*, 36) There was a well-known stoic philosopher of Alexandria named Pantaenus, who came to faith in Christ and went to preach in India. When he arrived he was amazed to discover many converts. For Bartholomew, one of the apostles, had preached to them, and left them with the writing of Matthew in the Hebrew language, which they would have preserved till that time.
- 2. <u>He is said to have ministered in Phrygia</u>. And here he was killed despite the stories that he escaped martyrdom and lived to preach the gospel elsewhere.
- 3. He is said to have ministered in Armenia. The Armenian Church claims Bartholomew as its founder. Here Bartholomew is said to have preached with great power. A personal description of him is given. He has black, curly hair, white skin, large eyes, straight nose, his hair covers his ears, his beard long and grizzled, middle height. He wears a white robe with a purple stripe, and a white cloak with four purple gems at the corners. For twenty-six years he has worn these, and they never grow old. His shoes have lasted twenty-six years. He prays a hundred times a day and a hundred times a night. His voice is like a trumpet; angels wait upon him; he is always cheerful, and knows all languages. The legends and the physical descriptions are all very interesting, and so is the apocryphal Gospel of Bartholomew.

This spurious writing describes a series of questions that Bartholomew addressed to Jesus and to Mary in the time between the resurrection and the ascension.

- a. Bartholomew asked Jesus where He went from the Cross. The Lord answered that He went down from the Cross-to Hades, and brought forth thence all the patriarchs and came again unto the Cross.
- b. Bartholomew asked how many souls die and are born each day. The answer is that 30,000 souls die each day, of whom only 3,000 are found righteous; and 30,001 souls are born each day into the world.
- c. Bartholomew asked Mary about the Annunciation, and Mary described her experience in great detail. The summary of the life of Bartholomew is simple since the *New Testament* reveals nothing about him except his name. The legends that arose around him are valuable for they reveal a man who intimately knew the Lord and lived to introduce others to Him.

According to tradition Bartholomew died a painful death:

- 1. He was first flayed alive for his preaching in Armenia.
- 2. He was punctured through the thighs with a spear after being severely beaten by clubs.

If that is true, then the church is reminded once more that it is blessed with a rich spiritual heritage of self-sacrificing, suffering souls. Surely the apostles are worthy of our admiration and even our gratitude. In the person of Bartholomew, we are reminded that we are a privileged people. Millions have lived and died without hearing the gospel or the name of Jesus. We have. And for those who desire to know Christ intimately, we are even more privileged for Christ said that anyone, who came to Him, He would never cast out.



3. In the person of Bartholomew we discover a sense of unworthiness in ourselves. All of the apostles, with one exception, entered into the sufferings of the Lord in a very real way.

They were all faithful men unto death.

And so the song writer Wells asks,

Must Jesus bear the Cross alone? And all, the world goes free? No, there's a cross for everyone, And there's a cross for me.

Bartholomew is the quiet man among the apostles. He does not speak in Scripture officially but i think i hear him saying, *My life with Christ was worth it all*. And to that end we can all say, *Amen*.


