

Ko teia ireira ta nga Ekalesia i orongaia e i

akatutu mai no runga i te oraanga o teia au Mama: Avarua – SHEBA, Nikao – SARA, Arorangi – DEBORA, Titikaveka – RUTA, Ngatangiia – ESETERA, Matavera – DELILA.

Some of us had never graduated before, some of us had never received a certificate before. This was the day that we could say that 'we made it' to the end of this part and the beginning of knowing who God really is. All the assignments, the group work, presentations, and even the countless hours of being in a classroom had all paid off. We are encouraged in the classrooms by our lecturers to read, read and read. Dr. Seuss tells us that the more that you read, the more things you will know, the more that you learn the more places you will go. The day of our graduation has given us an eye opener and changed most of our lives thinking that this is what we want for our children as they get an education.

#### 5. FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK



ia Orana tatou katoatoa i te aroa maata o te Atua. The beginning of the year looked very promising but it would become very busy as the Apiianga worked very hard to complete their studies. There have been some major highlights during year, despite the covid-19 situation, that I would like to describe in this report. We allowed minimal interruptions to the studies which, at times, limited our

numbers in attending meetings, however we were focused on ensuring that all the students would complete their studies. As I write this, I am thankful for all the support systems that are in place which ensured that Takamoa would successfully achieve two Graduations followed by two Ordinations in the same year as well as process the new intake for 2021. The approval of the Accreditation was a highlight in August which saw the completion of three years of hard work that required specialised input and writing of a Quality Management System (QMS) as well as reviewing of a curriculum that met and complied with the accreditation system.

#### 1: GRADUATION, FEBRUARY 2020

The graduation was just like one you would attend overseas and saw the Lecturers in their gowns, hoods, bonnets and caps. The opening song which lead the procession into the hall, was taken from Psalms 23 and conveyed the idea of our Great Shepherd leading and guiding us in the ministry. The song was sung by Shekinah Marsters and Teuira William, with Unuia Unuia on the keyboards. Mr Ken Ben was the Master of Ceremony, Rev Vakaroto Ngaro led the Devotion and opening prayer. Orometua Ngateitei Rev Tuaine Ngametua OBE, officiated the welcome followed by Mr Tangata Vainerere sharing the opening address. This address reiterated the vision and mission statement of the College and addressed the ongoing theme, "The Next Level" and the importance of the Accreditation. The Keynote Speaker for the night was Dr Teina Rongo

#### 3: ACCREDITATION WITH SPATS

Since 2017 it has been a priority to review and prepare Takamoa to pursue accreditation with the South Pacific Association of Theological Schools (SPATS). The application for accreditation is for the Institution and the Academic Programs. This has been a 3-year process that covered many areas to ensure Takamoa would be aligned and comply with the accreditation process. Theological and Biblical Educational systems were thoroughly looked at within the Pacific region and abroad. Universities and other Theological Colleges and Schools were studied to get a broader overview of the curriculum and academic programs. Due to the influences of the New Zealand and the Australian Government within the Pacific, as well as the Educational systems by



both these countries such as the NZQA and AQF, there was a need to understand the nature and process of both of these two educational systems.

This year has seen two applications submitted to the South Pacific Association of Theological Schools (SPATS) and Takamoa received a second visit by the SPATS Commission on 15<sup>th</sup> February for five days. On the 15<sup>th</sup> February two SPATS Commissioners (Rev Dr Mosese Mailo, Chairman of SPATS Commission, and Rev Rusiate Tuidrakulu, Secretary of SPATS Commission) arrived and completed their inspection, interviews and meetings in relation to the Takamoa Accreditation. In August we received a letter of confirmation that SPATS had approved our two Applications. There were recommendations and we are currently working on these matters due to a revisit by the SPATS Commission in 2023.

#### 1: Accreditation of Institution

This confirmed that Takamoa Theological College is an Accredited Institution.

#### 2: Accreditation of Academic Programs

This confirmed the accreditation of the following three Academic Programs:

Certificate in Biblical Studies (Level 4), Certificate in Youth Ministry (level 4), Diploma in Theology (Level 6),

The Degree Program, Bachelor of Theology has already been submitted for consideration. Following the visit in February, there needed to be some slight adjustments to align to the recommendations of the Commission to ensure the continued compliance to the guidelines and principles of the Pacific Qualification Framework (PQF) in the context of Theological education in the South Pacific.

#### **Credit Value**

"The PQF is a credit-based framework. The volume of learning of complete qualifications and their components is defined in terms of credits where a credit represents the notional time it takes an average learner to achieve the learning outcomes of a component of a qualification. Notional hours include time in direct contact (as in lectures and tutorials), practical and field work, time in independent study and time spent doing assessments. One credit is equivalent to ten notional hours of learning at the appropriate level. A year of full-time study is, therefore, notionally equivalent to 120 credits. The total credit volume of a qualification is the sum of the credits of its components which may be units, modules, courses, papers, or competencies expressed as whole numbers.

#### **Credit Points**

Credit points are used to quantify complete qualifications and components of qualifications and to give them a value. The numerical value (number of credits) assigned to a full qualification (as well as to its components) represents the estimated time needed for a typical learner to demonstrate that all the specified outcomes have been achieved.

#### Levels

There are ten levels within the PQF that are described in terms of their level of complexity of learning. Generic descriptors are used across three domains: knowledge and skills, application, and autonomy.

- Enable comparison of qualifications and components of qualifications regardless of length or duration of the designed program.
- Are open-ended at the top and bottom levels, enabling all learning to be recognized.
- Do not discriminate between qualifications derived from different sectors."

(SPATS, Accreditation Standards Guideline (2016), sec 2, 2.1, 2.2, p18)






# **MEMORY LANE**

I am indebted to the Head of the Ministry of Cultural Development (Anthony [Ants] Turua), Government of the Cook Islands, for kindly granting me permission to access and publish via this newsletter since 2018, Cook Islands memory-lane photos of yester-years from the Archive Division of his Ministry. Much appreciation also goes to Ms Paula Paniani, the Ministry's Archivist, for going through old records and collections to retrieve and make e-copies of the images. There is only one purpose here; to facilitate dissemination of the images to Cook Islanders (and interested non-Cook Islanders as well) scattered all over the Pacific and beyond, who will no doubt resonate with some of the images in this and future issues of the newsletter for a number of reasons: they might sight ancestors or can recognise some of the current events related to those of years gone by, and so on. This is the last lot of photos from Ms Paniani.

#### 1. GOSPEL DAY (NUKU) IMAGES ON RAROTONGA FROM THE 1960s & 1970s

October 26 every year is public holiday to commemorate the arrival of Christianity to the Cook Islands (Aitutaki) on this day in 1821. The CICC parishes get together to showcase allocated Biblical dramas, known as Nuku. The Nuku photos below come from the Johnson Studio collection being kept at the National Archives for the enjoyment of future generations.





#### 2. TIU TE MATANGI

A popular song in the Tapere of Avatiu/Ruatonga on Rarotonga. It is also regularly aired on Cook Islands Radio for the past 50-odd years, and frequently brought to life in many social gatherings of all sorts. The lyrics were part of the eulogy hand-out for the late Andrew Turua (refer CICC newsletter #77 p.26, issued March 2020).

#### The Words in Cook Is Maori

Tiu te matangi, te araranga nei Te mareureu te ava i tai e

Kua angi-ata te maru ki te Rua o te Tonga

Tira'a ua i te aiai Uri taua e na tai te enua Uri taua ki uta i te o Maunga kua tarai ia ki te ata o te po Rua manga i te anakenake Te vai nei

Te upoko teie te kapiki nei To rima e taku nga Tapere Tu'a anga o te mou te ruru okotai Ei puka reka anga na taua Te toru o te marama te atea Te vairanga anga o te ra Taoanga kua akara'i ia ki te ngateitei Rangatira ki te anakenake te vai nei

#### Translation

The rustling of the wind "Tiu" The setting of the sun reflected upon the passage The shadow can be seen stretching to the village of Ruatonga While enjoying the evening breeze Look towards the coastland. Uritaua ki Tai

Look also towards the valley, Uritaua ki Uta A hill standing as if carved during the night Its name is Rua-manga and it stands alone Continues to exist

A voice is heard from the head of the Tribe Your offering of hand my two tapere To embrace us as one Let's talk and be proud of it Three months away The day has been set A title to be ranked to its highest There is this Rangatira title out there that needs to be filled to represent and promote the interests of the community.

Note: while views differ on the song's history and background, the following are commonly understood:

- Tiutematangi has a deep meaning; it is a name referring to both wind direction and an ancestor of Ngati Uritaua.
- The song is composed by the late Turepu Turepu, a well-known orator and composer who also formed the oncepopular local cultural Taakoka Dance Troupe in the 1970's/80's. It was recorded by the Troupe and Apiti Nicholas of Avatiu.
- The spiritual richness contained in the lyrics is proudly treasured by the Ngati Uritaua tribe. It continues to be enjoyed by residents of the two settlements whenever and wherever they congregate for whatever purpose.
- The Rangatira mentioned at the end, although referring originally to an elected community-based representative, can also be looked upon as referring to any socially responsible senior-level title that the two settlements elect to represent their interests in the 3-tier pillars of the country, i.e. Aronga Mana, Government, and Church.

Comments on the background and history of the song were provided by Enua Pakitoa, Teariki Purua, Doreen Boggs, Teariki Rongo and Vaine Turepu-Clarke. Re-typing for the purpose of this paper is by Nga Mataio.

#### **8 EVIDENCE-BASED HEALTH BENEFITS OF PAPAYA (aka Pawpaw)**

The papaya is an incredibly healthy tropical fruit. It's loaded with antioxidants that can reduce inflammation, fight disease and help keep you looking young. Here are 8 health benefits of papaya.

#### 1. Delicious and Loaded With Nutrients

Papaya is the fruit of the *Carica papaya* plant. It originated in Central America and Southern Mexico but is now grown



in many other parts of the world. Papaya contains an enzyme called papain, which can break down the tough protein chains found in muscle meat. Because of this, people have used papaya to tenderize meat for thousands of years. If the papaya is ripe, it can be eaten raw. However, unripe papaya should always be cooked before eating — especially during pregnancy, as the unripe fruit is high in latex, which can stimulate contractions. Papayas are shaped similar to pears and can be up to 20 inches (51 cm) long. The skin is green when unripe and orange when ripe, while the flesh is yellow, orange or red. The fruit also has many black seeds, which are edible but bitter. One small papaya (152 grams) contains:

Calories: 59

Carbohydrates: 15 grams

Fiber: 3 gramsProtein: 1 gram

Vitamin C: 157% of the RDIVitamin A: 33% of the RDI

Folate (vitamin B9): 14% of the RDI

Potassium: 11% of the RDI

Trace amounts of calcium, magnesium and vitamins B1, B3, B5, E and K.

Papayas also contain healthy antioxidants known as carotenoids — particularly one type called lycopene. What's more, your body absorbs these beneficial antioxidants better from papayas than other fruits and vegetables.

SUMMARY The papaya is a tropical fruit high in vitamins C and A, as well as fiber and healthy plant compounds. It also contains an enzyme called papain, used to tenderize meat.

#### 2. Has Powerful Antioxidant Effects

Free radicals are reactive molecules created during your body's metabolism. They can promote oxidative stress, which can lead to disease. Antioxidants, including the carotenoids found in papayas, can neutralize free radicals. Studies note that fermented papaya can reduce oxidative stress in older adults and people with prediabetes, mild hypothyroidism and liver disease.



Also, many researchers believe that excessive free radicals in the brain are an important factor in Alzheimer's disease. In one study, people with Alzheimer's given a fermented papaya extract for six months experienced a 40% drop in a biomarker which indicates oxidative damage to DNA — and is also linked to aging and cancer. The reduction in oxidative stress is attributed to papaya's lycopene content and ability to remove excess iron, which is known to produce free radicals.

SUMMARY Papaya has powerful antioxidant effects, which may reduce oxidative stress and lower your risk of several diseases.

#### 3. Has Anticancer Properties

Research suggests that the lycopene in papaya can reduce cancer risk. It may also be beneficial for people who are being treated for cancer. Papaya may work by reducing free radicals that contribute to cancer. Additionally, papaya may have some unique effects not shared by other fruits. Among 14 fruits and vegetables with known antioxidant properties, only papaya demonstrated anticancer activity in breast cancer cells. In a small study in older adults with inflammation and precancerous stomach conditions, a fermented papaya preparation reduced oxidative damage. However, more research is needed before recommendations can be made.

SUMMARY Early research suggests that the antioxidants in papaya may reduce cancer risk and perhaps even slow cancer progression.

#### 4. May Improve Heart Health

Adding more papaya to your diet may boost your heart health. Studies show that fruits high in lycopene and vitamin C may help prevent heart disease. The antioxidants in papaya may protect your heart and enhance the protective effects of "good" HDL cholesterol. In one study, people who took a fermented papaya supplement for 14 weeks had less inflammation and a better ratio of "bad" LDL to "good" HDL than people given a placebo. An improved ratio is linked to a reduced risk of heart disease.

SUMMARY Papaya's high vitamin C and lycopene content can improve heart health and may reduce your risk of heart disease.

#### 5. May Fight Inflammation

Chronic inflammation is at the root of many diseases, and unhealthy foods and lifestyle choices can drive the inflammatory process. Studies show that antioxidant-rich fruits and vegetables like papaya help reduce inflammatory markers. For example, one study noted that men who increased their intake of fruits and vegetables high in carotenoids had a significant decrease in CRP, a particular inflammatory marker.

SUMMARY Chronic inflammation is at the root of many diseases. Papayas are very high in carotenoids that can reduce inflammation.

#### 6. May Improve Digestion

The papain enzyme in papaya can make protein easier to digest. People in the tropics consider papaya to be a remedy for constipation and other symptoms of irritable bowel syndrome (IBS). In one study, people who took a papaya-based formula for 40 days had significant improvement in constipation and bloating. The seeds, leaves and roots have also been shown to treat ulcers in animals and humans.

SUMMARY Papaya has been shown to improve constipation and other symptoms of IBS. The seeds and other parts of the plant have also been used to treat ulcers.

#### 7. Protects Against Skin Damage

In addition to keeping your body healthy, papaya can also help your skin look more toned and youthful. Excessive free radical activity is believed to be responsible for much of the wrinkling, sagging and other skin damage that occurs with age. The vitamin C and lycopene in papaya protect your skin and may help reduce these signs of aging. In one study, supplementing with lycopene for 10–12 weeks decreased skin redness after sun exposure, which is a sign of skin injury. In another, older women who consumed a mixture of lycopene, vitamin C and other antioxidants for 14 weeks had a visible and measurable reduction in depth of facial wrinkles.

SUMMARY The powerful antioxidants in papaya can help your skin recover from sun damage and may defend against wrinkling.

#### 8. Delicious and Versatile

Papaya has a unique taste that many people love. However, ripeness is key. An unripe or overly ripe papaya can taste very different from a perfectly ripe one. When optimally ripe, papaya should be yellow to orange-red in color, although a few green spots are fine. Like an avocado, its skin should yield to gentle pressure. Its flavor is best when cold, so it's a good idea to keep it refrigerated whenever possible. After washing it well, you can cut it in half lengthwise, scoop out the seeds, and eat it out of the rind with a spoon, like cantaloupe or melon. As it's incredibly versatile, it can also be combined with other foods that complement its flavor. Here are a few easy recipe ideas using one small papaya:

Breakfast: Cut it in half and fill each half with Greek yogurt, then top with a few blueberries and chopped

nuts

- Appetizer: Cut it into strips and wrap a slice of ham or prosciutto around each strip.
- Salsa: Chop papaya, tomatoes, onions and cilantro, then add lime juice and mix well.
- Smoothie: Combine the diced fruit with coconut milk and ice in a blender, then blend until smooth.
- Salad: Chop papaya and avocado into cubes, add diced cooked chicken and dress with olive oil and vinegar.
- Dessert: Combine the chopped fruit with 2 tablespoons (28 grams) of chia seeds, 1 cup (240 ml) of almond milk and 1/4 teaspoon of vanilla. Mix well and refrigerate before eating.

SUMMARY Papaya is a delicious fruit that is best enjoyed ripe. It can be eaten alone or easily combined with other foods.

#### The Bottom Line

Papaya is rich in valuable nutrients and has a delicious taste. Its powerful antioxidants like lycopene may reduce your risk of many diseases — especially ones that tend to come with age, such as heart disease and cancer. It may also defend against the visible signs of aging, helping your skin remain smooth and youthful. Try adding this healthy and delicious fruit to your diet today.

# 1. <u>'HE WAS SCREAMING.' 67-YEAR-OLD USES MARTIAL ARTS ON SENIOR HOME</u> INTRUDER, CA COPS SAY

'He was screaming.' 67-year-old uses martial arts on senior home intruder, CA cops say. Lorenza Marrujo grabbed a baseball bat when she realized someone had broken into her home. Marrujo, 67, who studied jujitsu for over two decades, said Donald Robert Prestwood, 59, broke into her apartment at a complex for seniors in Fontana on Monday, according to The San Bernardino Sun. She said she warded him off with a baseball bat and he left.



Police said Prestwood then assaulted 81-year-old Elizabeth McCray, Marrujo's neighbor and friend, the publication reported.



Marrujo said she used her martial arts skills to take him down. "I had to bend his fingers back ... to get him off her. He was screaming because that's one of my techniques, the bent fingers. Then I went 'boom' with my elbow twice in his sternum," Marrujo said. "I didn't expect that little lady would be that brave," McCray said about Marrujo, according to CBS Los Angeles. "I said, 'Could you be careful, he's gonna kill us.' She said, 'Not tonight."

McCray was treated at the hospital and released a day later, according to the TV station. "We recommend that you dial 911 for emergency assistance, which, in this case, she did that, and she also jumped in," Jennie Venzor, spokesperson for the Fontana Police Department, said. "What she told me is that her training kicked in, and it was like a muscle memory. She knew she had to help her friend out."

Prestwood was arrested and faces charges of elder abuse, according to inmate records. He is being held on \$150,000 bail at West Valley Detention Center, records show.

#### 2. SINGLE FOSTER DAD ADOPTS FIVE SIBLINGS SO THEY WON'T BE SEPARATED

Robert Carter, a single father in Florida, grew up in foster care and did not want the siblings to be separated. A single Florida man became a father of five after officially adopting an entire family of siblings to prevent them from being separated by the foster care system last week. According to a local NBC affiliate, Friday, Robert Carter adopted siblings Marionna, Makayla, Robert, Giovanni, and Kiontae. When asked why he chose to take such a huge leap of faith, he explained that he personally knew how it felt to be removed from a biological home and ripped away from loved ones.



Carter –who is originally from Hamilton County, Ohio –went into the foster care system when he was 12 and as a result, spent years estranged from some of his younger siblings. Fortunately, when he got older he emancipated and ultimately granted custody of his younger sister and guardianship of his younger brother. "When permanent custody was awarded to JFS, the five siblings were already placed in three different foster homes," explained adoption worker Stacey Barton.

"Mr. Carter was the only foster parent willing and able to adopt all of the children. His childhood background has made him aware of the importance of keeping siblings together. He says that he enjoys being their father and that parenting them is easier than he could have ever imagined! His life is busy, with a lot of love, laughter and loudness! I have enjoyed working with him and witnessing the children bond as siblings."

"I understand how they feel," said Carter who was fostering the three boys when he and the two girls' individual foster moms all came together to reunite the children for the first time in six months. "I understand what they went through, so it really touched me. I was already thinking about adopting all of the kids but when I saw them crying, I was like, 'Ok, I'm going to take all five to keep them together." He believed that taking care of his siblings along with his time mentoring and volunteering at South Avondale Elementary prepared him to adopt.

"Making memories to replace a lot of the bad ones." Carter said. "Every night I talk to them and let them know, 'I'm your dad forever. I know what it's like and I'm always here for you.' Like Marionna. She's warmed up so much since the beginning. At first, she didn't like me. She walked in my room last night and said, 'I just want to say thanks for taking us in and taking care of us when our real mom couldn't.' It just really touched me. So just making memories, letting them know I'm here and they never have to go. I'm here for them no matter what."

#### 3. THE NUMBER 80

Note: this write-up about number is attributed to this issue #80 of the newsletter – editor.

Part of the meaning of the number 80 comes from the fact that it can represent the start or duration of freedom from oppressors. Moses was 80, and his older brother Aaron was 83, when they challenged Pharaoh to free the children of Israel from their bondage (Exodus 7:7). Moses, whom God blessed by not having his strength or eyesight diminish as he aged, lived to the age of 120 (Deuteronomy 34:7).

Ehud was a rare left-handed warrior in ancient Israel. He freed the people from eighteen years of Moabite oppression by killing their king and rallying the Israelites around his cause. After his victory, he was Israel's Judge for eighty years, the longest person to serve in the position (Judges 3:12 - 4:1).

#### Appearances of the number eighty

King Solomon, according to the Bible, used 80,000 (80 x 1000) aliens living in Israel to dig stones out of quarries that would be used to build God's temple in Jerusalem (1Kings 5:15, 2Chronicles 2:17 - 18).





Solomon states that a particular woman he loved was more precious than 60 queens, 80 concubines and an innumerable number of virgins (Song of Solomon 6:8).

A man named Ishmael, after he murdered Babylon's governor over Judah, killed eighty men who came to Jerusalem to mourn its destruction (Jeremiah 41:5).

#### Lifespans and the number 80

The only Psalm which credits Moses for writing it is Psalm 90 (see verse 1). In his prayerful hymn to God, he declares that humans live an average of 70 years. If, however, they are strong, they can live to be the ripe old age of 80.

For all our days pass away in Your wrath; we finish our years as with a sigh. The days of our years are threescore years and ten (70); and if by reason of strength they are fourscore years (80), yet their span is but trouble and sorrow . . . (Psalm 90:9 - 10).

Moses' statement that humans live seventy to eighty years, even though made more than 3,500 years ago, is surprisingly accurate today!

According to the CIA Factbook, the life expectancy in the world is almost 70 years (69.8). Men live an average of close to 68 years and women average living to 72. In the United States, a male can expect to live almost 78 years with females living to 82. The average for those in America is 80. The two countries in the world with the highest average life expectancy are Japan and Singapore. Their citizens can expect to live 5.5 more years than the U.S. average of 80!

#### Additional info on the Biblical Meaning of 80

King Uzziah of Judah, after winning several battles against his enemies, became a strong and respected leader who was well-known abroad (2Chronicles 26:1 - 15). He soon, however, became filled with vanity and pride. In an impulsive act, he attempted to offer incense at Jerusalem's temple, a ceremony only priests could perform.

Azariah the High Priest, along with eighty other priests, confront Uzziah in the temple over his intentions. The king, as he grew angry with the priests, was struck with leprosy (2Chronicles 26). One of Jesus' many parables was of an unjust steward who was told he would be fired (Luke 16). Before leaving his position, he reduced the debt of several who owed his boss. One person had their debt lessened from 100 to 80 measures of wheat (Luke 16:7). The parable was given to underscore a Christian's responsibility to use, as wisely as possible, the resources he has been given (verses 10 - 13).

#### 4. THE INDIAN DIVER WHO HAS SAVED MORE THAN 100 LIVES

For years, Shiva helped police find bodies in Hussain Sagar lake in the southern Indian city of Hyderabad. And then one day, he stopped someone before they jumped, saving a life for the first time. BBC Telugu's Balla Satish reports. Shiva, who uses only one name, says he was about 10 years old when he came across a group of policemen who were offering to pay anyone who would bring a body out of a nearby pond.

Police in India are underfunded and poorly trained. Many don't know how to swim and are not given funds to hire professional divers. So it's not uncommon for them to rely on such informal, even risky, arrangements. But when Shiva volunteered, he says, they were taken aback. "They initially refused saying I was too young. But I convinced them," he recalls.

He did the job and walked away with 40 rupees, now worth about \$0.54 or £0.42 but a decent sum for him at the time. That was 20 years ago. He is now 30 and still helping the local police. Shiva lives right by Hussain Sagar, a large artificial lake in the heart of the city. A popular tourist spot, the lake is also used during the Ganesha festival for immersing idols of the Hindu deity.



The statues disintegrate under water and Shiva fishes out the iron rods they are made of to sell to recyclers. But the lake is also a place where many come to die and Shiva often helps police retrieve bodies out of the water. Sometimes, he also helps them recover bodies from other rivers and lakes in the city.

Shiva does more than pulling bodies out of the lake - he often saves people before they jump into the water, and sometimes even after that. "I have lost count of how many bodies I have found. But I have saved 114 lives," he told the BBC. He is now also training his wife to swim so she can help retrieve bodies of women.

Inspector B Dhanalakshmi, who's posted at the police station near Hussain Sagar lake, acknowledges that Shiva has been "a huge help" to them. "I can't confirm how many people he has saved over the years, but I believe it's more than 100," she told the BBC. Suicide is still a crime in India and many people Shiva saves run away even before he can call the police.

Shiva says he never knew his parents and spent most of his childhood on the streets, with brief spells in orphanages. At some point - he can't be sure how old he was - he started living with a woman and her children who were also homeless. He grew close to them and it was one of her sons who taught him how to swim, a skill that changed the course of his life.

"I have lost a lot of friends over the years - to addictions, to disease, to hunger, to accidents," he says. The boy who taught him to swim - "my brother Lakshman," he calls him - accidentally drowned and another close friend died while trying to save someone else. He says because he couldn't save them, he's trying to make up for that by saving others.

Saving lives brings him some extra money - sometimes people he saves pay him as a token of their gratitude. And coverage in the local press has turned him into a minor celebrity and fetched him small roles in Telugu films. But Shiva says he doesn't consider saving lives a job.

People's motives for suicide, he says, vary - from exam pressures to love affairs gone wrong to family feuds and financial woes. He says sometimes the elderly try to kill themselves when they are abandoned by their children.

Recently, he says he saw a man jump into the lake, fearing he might have contracted the coronavirus. The man's friend then jumped in to save him and Shiva too jumped in, but he was only able to save the friend. He says the dead man's family members didn't even take the body, afraid of catching the virus. "So I cremated him," he says. "I saved another man who said his family had begun to neglect him since they thought he had the virus."

But his work comes at a cost - Hussain Sagar is heavily polluted and Shiva, who dives into the water regularly with no gear or suit, says he has developed skin rashes and caught other ailments, including a bout of typhoid. "There is no time to put on any gear. You have to react fast. If you see someone jump, you have to jump right away."

The lake also smells foul during the summer and snakes are commonly found on its shores, but Shiva has no plans to move on. "I want to stay here," he says. "Only if I stay here, I can save lives. The satisfaction of saving a life is supreme."

# 5. <u>VENETIANS FURIOUS OVER FAILURE TO ACTIVATE MOSES BARRIER AND PROTECT CITY FROM FLOODING</u>

Angry Venetians have been left mopping out their homes and shops after authorities failed to activate a multibillion euro sea barrier to save the city from flooding. Tests in recent months demonstrated that the Moses barrier is capable of shielding the World Heritage city from high tides, but when a surge in the sea level happened on Tuesday, it was not deployed. Weather forecasters had predicted a 1.25 metre high tide and Moses – a series of barriers which can close off the Venetian lagoon from the Adriatic – is normally not activated until the tide reaches 1.3 metres. But a combination of heavy rain and an unexpected *bora* wind, which blows from the north-east, pushed the high tide to 1.38 metres, flooding St Mark's Square and many other parts of Venice to knee-high level. By that time, it was too late to raise the barriers, giant hinged gates that are bolted to the sea floor and protect the three openings to the lagoon. "The situation is terrible, we are

under water," said Carlo Alberto Tessein, the guardian of St Mark's Basilica, which dominates St Mark's Square and is prone to flooding because it occupies the lowest part of the city. "Floods like this make the basilica ever more fragile."

"To have something like Moses and not use it is unfathomable," said Claudio Vernier, the president of an association of business owners in St Mark's Square. "Five centimetres more of high tide makes all the difference." Iginio Mascari, who runs a spice shop

near the Rialto Bridge, also said the barriers should have been raised. "Any fisherman knows that the weather in the lagoon changes from one moment to another," he told La Repubblica newspaper. With more high tides predicted on Thursday and Friday, the mayor of Venice said protocols for deploying Moses needed to be reviewed. Luigi Brugnaro said the city should have more say in whether to raise the barriers. That call is currently made by Rome-based Elisabetta Spitz, the government-appointed commissioner of the infrastructure project. "It is the city of Venice that must be able to make the decision," said Mr Brugnaro, who has been mayor for the last five years. "We need to find a system which will make us faster and more flexible to react. If the person making the decision is too far away, we risk having the situation that we see now."



# STUDY OF GENESIS

#### INTRODUCTION

(vs. 14), Let the water teem... (vs. 20), Let the land produce living creatures... (vs. 24), Let us make man... (vs. 26), Be fruitful and multiply... (vs. 28), Behold, I have given you every herb... (vs. 29).


The Book of Genesis declared it's origin with a Living God and ended with a dead man, the final words "...in a coffin in Egypt" It is the most important book in the Old Testament and therefore it is written from God's viewpoint. Basically, this book is very important for four main reasons:

First, it is the Book of Beginnings, Second, it is a Foundational Book, Third, it is the Book of Answers and Lastly, t is the Book of Truth

Book of Beginnings – Genesis is a trans-literation of the Greek word \( \subseteq \sub

We can never answer the important questions of life unless we go back to the beginning. The Humanist will also raise these thoughts regarding Life: The world's origin, Our existence, Purpose in life. The answers are in Genesis. The Humanist also tells us that there is no purpose in life, enjoy yourself, make the most of it while you can because there is nothing after life. If we believe that, then life became void as the creation was in the beginning. Remember the words of Jesus in this parable, "...You have plenty of good things laid up for many years. The New Testament is also based on Genesis. Every one of the first 3 chapters of Genesis is quoted in the New Testament either directly or



indirectly. For instance, when Jesus was asked about divorce, he referred them to Genesis 2. Paul explaining the cross in Romans 5:19, refers to Genesis 3 when he says, "For just through the disobedience of the one man, the many were made sinners, so also through the obedience of the one man, the many will be made righteous." In Revelations, we see the two books come together, written hundreds of years apart by two people who never met each other. All the themes which began in Genesis 1 – 3 are taken up and completed in Revelation 20 – 22. In Genesis we have a Paradise Lost and in Revelations, Paradise is regained. Also in Genesis, the Tree of Life disappears from the first few pages of the Bible and reappears in the last few pages of the Bible.

Book of Answers – That is why Genesis is ridiculed and scoffed at by men motivated by Satan. The devil hates Genesis and so deceives men and women into believing Genesis as a pack of fairy tales. He does this because Genesis exposes the devil and his plans. It predicts his destruction. "You (Satan) will bruise His (Christ) heels, and He (Christ) will crust Your (Satan) head" (Genesis 3:15)


It is the only book in the Bible which tells us all about our great enemy. Satan, no wonder, he hates this book. If the devil can remove the credibility of Genesis in the thinking of Christians, he will do so. That is why through the centuries, Genesis has been attacked more than any other book. Misinterpretations of Scripture and misunderstanding of Science has caused many Christians to stumble over Genesis.

Biblical Truth – Before we start to examine Genesis exegetically, we must understand that Biblical Truth starts with the existence of God and moves on the explain everything else. Nowhere in the Bible does God try and justify His own existence because He was already there in the beginning. In the Book of Hebrews "...whoever would draw near to God must believe that He exists...." (Heb. 11:6) "In the beginning God..." Truth begins here, Faith begins here, therefore We must begin here. We can either believe it or disbelieve it, God will remain the same.

#### **APPLICATION**

Genesis is absolutely true.

The God who took nothing and made something, can also take a nobody and make somebody. In fact, He cannot make anything out of a man until he is nothing. God can take outcasts and make them His Ambassadors. God who brings order out of chaos, can also bring order out of lives. The world is crying out for meaning and a craving for excitement, possessions, crime and lawlessness.



Today, God is in the re-creation business. He took a great sinner and made him an apostle – Paul. He took an adulterer and made him a holy man – David. He can do the same to each one of us. God is personal and wants a personal relationship with us. He is powerful and can sort out any problems in your life as the chorus goes: *There is no problem too big that He cannot solve it.* God is purposeful and can bring meaning and purpose to your life.
